2015-2017 DANE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

General Principles

The unique role counties play in administering state programs---human services, transportation, the environment, surface and ground waters, health, the justice system and other state-mandated services---must be recognized:

1. The state must fairly share responsibility with the counties in determining the scope, design and cost of statewide programs;

2. The state must provide an adequate and predictable share of funding for state services delivered by the counties;

3. The state must help counties reduce the need to rely on property taxes; and

4. The state should enhance the ability of counties to more effectively manage county government.

5. The state shall perform a biennial review of all mandated programs to determine continued need for the programs and annually review all mandated programs funded at 50% or less.

Eliminate Racial Disparities

The elimination of racial disparities and the elevation of racial equity are among the most important priorities and responsibilities of Dane County. Specific areas that help alleviate racial disparities include Child Welfare, Economic Wellbeing, Family Structure, Youth Initiatives, Education, Prevention, Employment, Criminal Justice, Health Care, Housing, Transportation, Economic Development, Contracting and Service Delivery.

In order to impact the current state and community crisis, we must be deliberate and proactive in our public policy response.

1) **Juvenile Justice**: Support continued funding for early intervention and intensive treatment programs.

2) **Career Development for Youth**: Support funding to provide educational, work skill development, transportation and mentoring services for youth or young adults who are at risk of dropping out, have dropped out of high school or who are unemployed post high school and lack the knowledge and skills necessary to secure and maintain gainful employment.

3) Early Childhood Initiative: Support legislation to continue funding for the Early Childhood Initiative programs.

4) **Apprenticeship/Internships**: Provide incentives for the business community and technical college system to create and support apprenticeship/internship opportunities to young adults. Expedite entry and graduation from the programs to meet increasing demands to fill vacancies created by an aging workforce.

5) **17 Year Olds**: Remove 17 year olds from the adult correctional system and return them to Juvenile Courts and Juvenile Corrections.

6) Countywide Youth Collaboration: Create two pilot programs funded at \$100,000 to foster countywide
 collaborative actions with School Districts, Law Enforcement Task Forces (drug, gang...). County Human Services,
 Sheriff, District Attorney, Community Youth Service Organizations and target services for all students, including parole
 activities.

7) Prevention Funding: Support initiatives that provide additional funds for primary prevention programs including
 delinquency, child abuse/neglect and elder/abuse neglect.

8) Youth Programs: Support continuation and expansions of programs focusing on prevention of delinquency, alcohol and other drug use, child abuse and neglect and domestic violence. Support increased funding and support for youth after school programs, especially at the middle school level.

9) Youth Aids: Support legislation to increase state funding for out-of-home care costs for juvenile offenders now paid for by Dane County. Limit increases in state rates for out of home placements for juveniles (including corrections, child caring institutions and residential care facilities) to no more than the increase in Youth Aids.

10) **Relative Caregivers**: Support legislation/policies that provide additional State support to relatives who take care of non-custodial children.

11) **Dental Access**: Support policies and/or legislation that would ensure access to dental care for all residents including those on Medical Assistance.

12) **Voter Registration Changes and Voter Identification Requirement**: Oppose legislation which changes same day voter registration, alters times for absentee ballot voting and requires photo identification to vote.

13) **Support Wisconsin's Successful System of Election Day Voter Registration**: Support Election Day voter registration and urge Wisconsin Legislature to maintain the current system.

62 14) Regional Transit Authority (RTA): Restore statutory language to allow creation of a Regional Transit 63 Authority/Authorities covering at a minimum the federally-designated Metropolitan Planning Area, and support statutory 64 language to allow up to a half-cent sales tax which would go to citizens for a binding referendum, be contingent on 65 receiving federal transit funds and RTA governance/operating structure would be determined after consultation with 66 community partners participating in the RTA. Support that sales tax funds are used for commuter rail, bus transit, 67 emergency/disabled transportation, local road and county highway projects.

68 State Audit Probation & Parole Program: Request the Legislative Audit Bureau to analyze Wisconsin's 15) probation and parole program for effectiveness and efficiencies; to identify improvements in procedures to streamline the revocation process in order to reduce days in jail; and compare the Wisconsin program to other states.

16) Prisoner Re-Entry: Adequately fund prisoner community re-entry programs to increase success and effectiveness.

17) Youth Courts: Support and fund Youth Courts in Wisconsin High Schools.

18) Close Public Defender Eligibility Gap: Support changing Public Defender eligibility levels to the same level as eligibility for appointed counsel to eliminate the gap that currently requires the court to appoint counsel at county expense.

19) Minority Outreach: Support state-sponsored outreach to communities about available support services.

69 71 72 73 75 77 77 78 90 20) Income Maintenance Programs: Support funding levels and legislation that provide sufficient resources to administer non-cash benefit programs such as Food Stamps, Medical Assistance, Child Care and issue benefits to all eligible people. Oppose changes to the eligibility/enrollment process and services funded under Medicaid and Income 81 Maintenance.

82 83 84 21) **Restrictions on Local Fair Housing Ordinances**: Oppose legislation that impinges on the rights of tenants by allowing landlords to discriminate based on a tenant's income, occupation, rental history, credit information, arrest/conviction history and Social Security number.

- 85 22) Wisconsin's Fair Employment Act: Oppose permitting an employer to refuse to employ, bar or terminate from 86 employment an individual who has been convicted of a felony and who has not been pardoned for that felony, and pre-87 empting local government from adopting ordinances concerning employment discrimination based on arrest or 88 conviction records that prohibit activity allowed under the state Fair Employment Act.
- 89 23) Landlord Regulation: Repeal 2011 WI Act 108, which prohibits local government ordinances that place limits or 90 requirements on landlords (Fair Housing Ordinance). Repeal 2011 WI Act 143, which prohibits a local government 91 92 from imposing a moratorium on eviction actions and amends/creates new provisions that benefit landlords including but not limited to allowing: landlord discretion in disposing/storing of medical/personal items; landlords to withhold a <u>9</u>3 tenant's security deposit or portion of for damages, unpaid rent/utility bills; and severability of rental agreements. 94 95 Repeal 2011-2012 budget bill provision which deletes landlord foreclosure notice. Repeal 2013 WI Act 76 (Prohibit Local Landlord Ordinances).
- 96 24) Minimum wage: Enacted 11/4/14 Referendum Ballot question, "Should the State of Wisconsin increase the 97 98 minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour?" Dane County voters approved this item by 73.6% yes votes and 26.4% no votes.
- 25) Medicaid Expansion: Support implementation of the Medicaid expansion under the federal Affordable Care Act 99 (ACA). Allow Wisconsin to use the Medicaid option to close the gap in BadgerCare for childless adults. If WI closes 100 the gap, full federal funding will be available for three years 2014-2016, followed by gradual reductions to 90% by 101 2020. ACA creates other innovative benefits and programs that states and counties will help to implement. Accept 102 available federal funds for BadgerCare to ensure that thousands of Wisconsin citizens have access to guality and 103 affordable health coverage.
- 104 26) County Jail: Support full state funding for probation/parole holds; continued support for the Treatment Alternative 105 Program (TAP); more funding for incarceration alternatives; support Justice Impact Statements.
- 106 27) Court Interpreters: Support appointing court interpreters to all cases regardless of indigency and support an 107 increase in state funding for reimbursement to counties for interpreter services.
- 108 28) Wisconsin Community Justice Reinvestment Act: Support creation of WCJRA to provide sentencing judges 109 with more effective treatment options while reducing the prison population and sharing the savings with counties to 110 fund local criminal justice/treatment programs.
- 111 29) Prevailing Wage: Oppose legislation that eliminates the prevailing wage requirement for public works and other 112 projects. The prevailing wage guarantees fair bids, guality work and middle class wages for skilled workers in Dane 113 County.

114 30) Sanctuary Cities/Counties: Oppose legislation that requires county workers/law enforcement to review 115 immigration status any time an individual comes in contact with government workers. Oppose banning specified 116 immigrants from living in communities. Urge Wisconsin to seek grants for Syrian refugee resettlement.

117 31) Racial Disparity Subcommittee: Support creation of a state Criminal Justice Coordinating Council subcommittee 118 on racial disparities within the criminal justice system.

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Human Services

General Issues

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188 189 1) Key Funding Streams: Support Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) increases in key funding areas from the state 190 including Youth Aids, Community Aids, COP and CIP.

191 **Economic Assistance** 192

193 1) W-2 Funding: Support funding to pay all W-2 cash benefits and administrative expenses

194 2) Childcare: Support sufficient funding for childcare. Expand eligibility to include childcare support for low-income 195 individuals pursuing higher education leading to employment.

196 3) Homeless Services: Provide additional State funding for services to assist individuals, unaccompanied youth and 197 families who are homeless.

198 4) Property Tax Exemptions Low Income Housing: Clarify 70.11 Wis. Stats. to define "maintenance" as "repair and 199 maintenance of property, capital replacements, insurance premiums, project management, debt retirement, project-200 related reserves, general administrative expenses, resident services, utilities, financing costs, preservation expenses 201 and similar project-related expenses."

202 5) Centralization of Economic Support Programs: Oppose initiatives to remove income maintenance administration 203 from counties and create a centralized income maintenance unit.

204 6) Medicaid Funding: Support enabling counties to accept/administer Medicaid funding at the county level.

205 7) Drug Testing: Oppose legislation that would enact drug testing as a requirement for public benefits. Also oppose 206 drug testing of youth in our public schools. 207

208 Services to Older Adults, the Developmentally/Physically Disabled and Mentally III 209

210 1) Birth to Three: Support additional financial support from the state for this program. Support a modification of State 211 Statutes to require health insurers to make third party payments to defray the cost of Birth to Three care for families 212 that have private health insurance policies.

2) Community Support Program (CSP): Continue program. Have additional state funding to help reduce county 213 214 costs and serve those whom can benefit from the program.

215 3) **RSVP Services**: Support increased funding for the RSVP Program

216 4) Seniorcare and BadgerCare: Maintain Seniorcare and BadgerCare continuing programs.

217 5) Handicap Access: Support "visit ability" legislation to allow handicap access devices in new homes or eliminate 218 barriers in older homes.

219 6) Long Term Care Reform: Plans developed by the state in the area of long term care need to protect quality and 220 221 222 223 223 224 availability of services to consumers and maintain control by the county of programs or relieve the county of financial aid and/or legal obligations for the programs and participants if the county is not involved with these programs in the future. The required county contribution towards LTC should be equitably negotiated. Support adequate funding for the start-up and ongoing funding of ADRCs. Amend Chapter 55 to delineate state and county responsibilities.

Equitable Funding for Long Term Care: Extend higher federal MA reimbursement rates under the federal 7) 225 stimulus package to current county-administered long term care MA waiver programs where county revenues comprise 226 227 the non-federal match. Support freezing further county participation in Family Care until the State can fully fund county program start-up costs and find more equitable ways of funding Family Care without penalizing counties, such as 228 229 230 Dane, for the substantial financial commitment and innovative approaches already taken to meet long term care needs of its residents."

8) Employment Services for Older Adults: Extend the use of state and county funds to encourage the business 231 232 233 234 community and technical colleges to create and support retraining and placement of older adults entering/re-entering employment, especially those lacking English proficiency.

9) Family Caregivers: Provide financial support and tax credits to family caregivers.

10) Dementia Patient Rights: Oppose involuntary psychotropic drug administration in Chapters 51 and 55.

235 11) **Comprehensive Community Services (CCS)**: Support continued full funding of the state match.

236 12) InvestaCare (Long Term Care Investment Fund): Support legislation to establish a long term care investment 237 savings program for individuals 18 years and older to meet future long term care needs through financial contributions.

238 13) Family Care/IRIS: Oppose changes that weaken the Family Care and IRIS programs, eliminate CIP/COP 239 waivers, propose negative changes to the Family Support program/Medicaid Personal Care Services, and weaken or 240 privatize Aging & Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs). Such changes will create dire consequences for people with 241 developmental/physical disabilities, including children and their families and older adults in Dane County.

242 14) Mental Health and Drug Addiction Treatment: Urge the state of Wisconsin to require increased insurance 243 coverage and MA reimbursement rates in addition to adequate statewide funding for mental health services and drug 244 addiction treatment programs.

245 15) Winnebago Mental Health Transfers: Urge DHS to rescind its requirement to transfer detained mental health 246 patients to Winnebago Mental Health Institute instead of Mendota.

247 Non-Emergency Medical Transportation: Currently Medical Transportation Management Inc. (MTM) is 16) 248 contracted by the state of Wisconsin to provide rides for Medicaid eligible individuals to gain access to medical 249 appointments. Contract provisions are skewed to reward MTM for denying rides instead of providing rides. Ongoing 250 complaints about the quality of service suggest little accountability or oversight creating greater problems for the 251 "transportation disadvantaged." Support entities or other actions that will hold MTM accountable, improve oversight of 252 the program, ensure quality, consistent services, resolve complaints and provide incentives for giving not denying 253 rides. 254

Programs to Serve Children, Youth and Families

1) Kinship Care: Support funding to meet needs of all that are eligible.

2) Wisconsin Medicaid Cost Reporting (WIMCR): Eliminate WIMCR program or fully reimburse counties for the 259 260 revenues they would have received under the Community Services Deficit Reduction Benefit (CSDRB) and Community Based Medicaid Administrative Claiming (CBMAC) programs which were impacted by the creation of WIMCR.

261 3) Family Child Care: Support legislation to extend the state rules governing foster care background checks to family 262 day care providers.

263 4) At-Risk Youth Report to School Board: Develop a program for newly released at-risk students to interact 264 with/give progress reports to school boards.

265 5) Law Enforcement Role in Child Abuse & Neglect: Oppose legislation that usurps the authority of county Child 266 Protective Services (CPS) by reporting all child abuse and neglect cases to law enforcement in lieu of CPS, increases 267 penalties and changes the neglect definition to target low income and marginalized communities. 268

Public Health Services

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270 271 1) **Response to Local Public Health Emergencies**: Support legislation that recognizes the critical role of local Public Health Departments in responding to public health emergencies and provides adequate funding to respond to all threats to public health.

272 273 274 2) Public Health Prevention: Support initiatives that maintain the integrity and effectiveness of public health prevention services.

275 276 3) Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease: Support the WI Department of Health and Family Services in its efforts to amend the administrative code to include Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease as a reportable disease.

277 278 278 4) Medical Marijuana: Support legislation allowing residents with debilitating medical conditions to acquire and 279 possess marijuana for medical purposes if supported by their physician. Dane County voters approved this item in 280 11/2/10 general election, 75.49% yes and 24.50% no.

281 5) Women's Health Care: Repeal all state laws that prohibit women from having access to safe and legal abortions, 282 283 that don't protect women's health and don't ensure a woman's dignity, equality and autonomy.

6) Support Wisconsin Well Woman Program: The Wisconsin Well Women Program pays for preventive health 284 screening services (Mammograms, Pap Smears....) for women with little or no health insurance coverage. Support 285 maintaining the program and oppose any cuts or elimination. 286

Veteran Services

289 1) Armed Forces: Support the Dane County soldiers who are presently serving. Support protecting families and jobs 290 rather than utilizing precious resources and funds to wage a war.

291 2) VFW Halls: Support a property tax exemption for chartered veterans' organizations.

292 3) **Property Tax Credit**: Eliminate the 65 year old age limit, drop the disability rating from 100% to 30% or greater, 293 294 and allow 10 consecutive years of Wisconsin residency after separation (this expands eligibility to veteran applicants whose home of record was not Wisconsin).

295 4) Trust Fund: Support an increase from state GPR to help stabilize the Trust Fund so veterans will no longer pay for 296 their own benefits and programs. The Trust Fund is financed through veteran programs such as personal and home 297 loans.

298 5) Wisconsin GI Bill: Fully fund the Wisconsin GI Bill without any limitations on eligibility.

299 6) State Funding for the Veteran Trust Fund: Support increased funding in the State budget bill to insure solvency 300 of the Veterans Trust Fund including but not limited to, the exploration of permanent state funding for the WI Dept. of 301 Veteran Affairs and the veteran programs/benefits that the Department oversees.

302 7) Ending Veteran Homelessness: Support ending veteran homelessness by maximizing state and federal 303 resources and streamlining local housing processes.

304 8) Mass Transit for Disabled Veterans: Support fully funding bus passes and other mass transit costs for all 305 service-connected disabled veterans in all Wisconsin locations and transit programs.

306 9) County Veteran Offices: Oppose legislation that cuts/restructures CVSO funding, reduces veteran services or 307 weakens the offices by regionalization.

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Transportation, Land Use and the Environment

1) Water Quality: Maintain level of DNR funds for water quality planning and watershed projects. Support increased
 DNR financial assistance as an incentive to reduce non-point source pollution. Seek a fair share of state funding for
 inland waterways and lakes. Target state funds to where there is a high likelihood of project success, where recipient
 units of government have a proven track record of meeting state and local water resource goals. Support legislation to
 provide additional funding and staffing for local water quality protection, improvement and unfunded mandates.

2) Local Transportation: Support a greater share of state and federal transportation funding going toward local transportation needs and services. Funding should be increased for General Transportation Aids, State Highway Maintenance, the County Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS) and Specialized Transportation for older adults and persons with disabilities. Require "farmland mitigation" for highway improvement projects. In addition, funding formulas that discriminate against urban counties should be revised and the local match (now 50%) for CHIPS should be decreased.

326 3) Bicycle Trail Funding: Work with Legislators and State Agencies to obtain transportation aids for bicycle trails
 327 with significant commuter traffic. Support allowing bike path maintenance costs to be eligible for transportation aids.
 328 Support the creation and development of a statewide Bike Trail Task Force. Integrate bicycle transportation into future
 329 commuter transportation systems

330 4) **Regional Trail System**: Request DNR assistance in development of regional trail systems.

331 5) Highway Workers Safety: Earmark a portion of every state construction/maintenance contract to fund increased
 332 local law enforcement in construction/maintenance zones.

6) Soil Erosion: Support DNR and/or legislative streamlining of NR297 process to deal more quickly with cropland
soil erosion that threatens water resources. Control soil erosion to acceptable limits, e.g., tolerable soil loss levels, for
the production of food and fiber. Support DATCP Soil and Water Resource Management programs implementation,
e.g., NR243 cost sharing and Land and Water Resource Management Plan implementation and cost sharing.

7) Recycling: Support long-term state funding for state's recycling program. Support continued state efforts to
 expand markets for recycled materials. Amend statutes to allow local governments or other entities to receive more
 than one state grant for innovative demonstration projects.

8) Landfill Siting: Allow municipalities to replace existing public landfills without a new DNR needs determination.
 Amend statutes to modify landfill negotiation-mediation process to include counties as an appropriate governing body
 for the approval of negotiated agreements. Amend statutes to prohibit the construction of landfills until the mediation andfill siting: Allow municipalities to replace existing public landfills without a new DNR needs determination.
 Amend statutes to modify landfill negotiation-mediation process to include counties as an appropriate governing body
 for the approval of negotiated agreements. Amend statutes to prohibit the construction of landfills until the mediation negotiating process is complete.

344 9) **Cleansweep**: Support increased state/federal funding for household and Ag Clean Sweep.

345 10) Boating Laws: Support legislation making fines and associated penalties for drunken boating commensurate with
 346 those for drunken driving.

347 11) Stewardship Fund: Support annually adjusting the State Stewardship Fund for inflation to maintain at least 1990
 348 funding levels. Eliminate Stewardship Fund requirements for hunting and trapping.

12) **State Urban Forestry Grants**: Allow towns, counties, and non-profits to access both the federal and state funds in the Urban Forestry Grant Program.

351 13) Payments in Lieu of Taxes: Authorize counties to make payments in lieu of taxes to other local units of
 352 government when the county takes land off the tax rolls for conservation purposes.

Holding Tanks as Systems of Last Resort: Support changes in statutes and administrative rules that oppose
 using holding tanks except as a last resort for new and replacement septic systems. Modify rules and statutes to
 ensure funding from the Wisconsin Fund is for the least costly systems, excluding holding tanks, unless a holding tank
 is the system of last resort.

357 15) Revise Formula for DATCP Administrative Funding to Counties: Support a revision in the formula the 358 Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) uses to distribute administrative funding to 359 counties for administration of the Farmland Preservation Program, Nutrient Management Program and the 360 implementation of performance standards. Use criteria for distribution that include number of farms, acres of cropland, 361 number of livestock and amount of resource waters in a county.

362 16) State Commercial Building Code: Support the exemption from the state Commercial Building Code of farm363 buildings used for agricultural purposes or horse boarding/stabling facilities.

364 17) Fair Motorboat Gas Tax Allocation: Support legislation to fairly allocate motorboat fuel tax through a more 365 equitable distribution formula.

366 18) Stormwater Utility: Amend the WI Stats. to allow counties to create and manage a stormwater utility.

367 19) Mercury Products Ban: The State should ban the sale of mercury-containing products, with the exception of dental fillings and fluorescent lamps. If the ban is implemented on a phased-in basis, retailers should be required to take back for recycling those mercury-containing products that they are selling until the ban for each product takes effect.

- 371 20) Boater Registration Act: Authorize the state to license, regulate, and require education/training for operation of 372 motorized watercraft.
- 373 21) Mercury Rules: Support changes to the mercury rules to achieve a 90% reduction per DNR rule.
- 374 22) Wisconsin Land Information Program: Support the continuation of the Wisconsin Land Information Program 375 and grants.
- 376 23) **DNR Budget Reductions**: Oppose reductions in DNR staffing that affect Dane County water programs, including regulatory programs, lake/fishery, runoff specialists, conservation wardens, land conservation and parks programs.
- 378 24) **Comprehensive Planning**: Oppose legislation, which repeals the comprehensive planning statutes.
- 379 26) **Power Plants**: Support efforts to clean up dirty power plants.
- 380 27) Transmission Lines: Request the State supports an independent study of the need for additional high voltage
 381 transmission lines through Dane County.
- 382 28) Takings Legislation: Oppose legislation that would require county government to compensate real property
 383 owners for restricted use or loss of property value as a result of law or regulations.
- 384 29) **Airport Authority**: Oppose legislation that takes airport governance away from county government and gives it to a private/public airport authority.
- 386 30) American Transmission Company (ATC) Requirement: Urge Wisconsin Public Service Commission to require
 387 ATC to construct power lines underground to protect Dane County economic and environmental resources while
 and reliability during extreme weather events.
- 389 31) Reduce Fine Particle Emissions: Target fine particle pollution non-attainment areas by providing increased funding and new incentives for fine particle emission reduction programs, including programs that reduce emissions from transportation sources and point sources through the increased use of alternative fuels, renewable energy sources, and energy efficiency improvements.
- 393 32) **Diesel Idling Regulations**: Support statewide implementation of diesel idling regulations for trucks, buses and 394 other diesel engines.
- 33) Comprehensive Approach to Control Lake Levels: Request the DNR to adopt a comprehensive approach to
 managing the levels of the lakes through collaboration with affected parties, including dam operators, municipalities
 and regulatory agencies toward improving natural hydrologic conditions and habitat.
- 398 34) **Oppose State Increases in Landfill/Solid Waste Fees and Program Reductions**: Oppose state increases to 399 the landfill recycling tipping fee and environmental repair fee. Oppose the elimination or reduction of recycling and solid waste programs.
- 401 35) Verona Road Project: Support mitigation measures to lessen the impact of the Verona Road construction project
 402 on surrounding neighborhoods and local businesses. Those measures include noise barriers, monitoring air quality,
 403 preservation of commercial areas, minimizing impacts on established neighborhoods, storm water management (steer
 404 away from Dunn's Marsh), and develop bike lanes, pedestrian/bicycle bridges and sidewalks on frontage and
 405 neighborhood roads.
- 406 36) Alternative Energy Production: Support statewide funding in the form of grants and incentives leading to the increased use of renewable energy sources such as wind, solar and biomass.
- 408 37) Green Jobs Economic Development: Support statewide funding in the form of grants or incentives, for counties
 409 to develop, create and attract green job opportunities with green companies or industry.
- 410 38) **Keep Asian Carp Out of Wisconsin Waterways**: Call on the WI Department of Natural Resources and the 411 federal government to increase their efforts to stop the destructive advance of the Asian carp through Wisconsin.
- 412 39) **Mining Reform**: Monitor mining reform legislation, oppose provisions that usurp local government role and 413 suspend floodplain rules that would nullify flood insurance and federal disaster assistance.
- 414 40) **Renewable Energy**: Oppose legislation that restricts or prevents waste-to-energy and renewable energy as 415 viable energy sources for utilities and consumers.
- 416 41) North Mendota Parkway: Oppose the construction of four lanes on Main Street (HWY 19) in Waunakee. 417 Support an update of the 2003 North Mendota Parkway traffic study, and request WIDOT to consider how the 418 proposed North Mendota Parkway, Hwy 19, CTH K, CTH M and Hwy 13 relate to each other and Hwy 12. Support an 419 implementation review of the "North E-Way".
- 42) Restore Funding for Soil & Water Resource Management Program: Return \$9.3 million to state aid for county 421 conservation employees who assist WI farmers and help grow the state's agriculture industry.
- 422 43) **Clean Energy Choice**: Support legislation to increase affordability/sustainability of renewable energy in 423 Wisconsin.
- 424 44) **Divestment from Fossil Fuels**: Support zero investments in fossil fuel companies for Dane County, all local governments and state institutions.
- 426 45) Support Local Control of Erosion and Storm Water Management Standards: Oppose standardizing
- regulation of construction site erosion, storm water management and prohibiting local governments from enacting localordinances that are stricter than statewide standards.
- 429 46) Support Local Control of Nonmetallic Mining: Oppose any state legislation that preempts local governments
- 430 from enacting their own nonmetallic mining regulations and oversight of air/water quality, highway damage, noise and 431 use contracts.

- 432 47) **Update Wisconsin 2030 State Rail Plan**: Support funding and planning for intercity rail serving Dane County and 433 Madison and urge WIDOT to work with Minnesota DOT on Milwaukee-Twin Cities High Speed Rail Study.
- 434 48) Water Management: Support local governmental efforts to improve water management through water 435 conservation, a balanced water budget and enhanced groundwater recharge.
- 436 49) High Capacity Wells: Oppose limiting, relaxing or thwarting the regulation of high capacity wells.
- 437 50) Foreign Interests in Farmland: Oppose legislation that removes limits on foreign ownership of Wisconsin 438 agricultural land.
- 439 51) Non-Therapeutic Use of Antibiotics in Livestock: Support national/statewide ban on non-therapeutic use of antibiotics in livestock production/agriculture.
- 52) Effigy Mounds & Burial Sites: Oppose legislation that allows the disturbance or destruction of Native American effigy mounds and old burial sites.
- 443 53) Highway Funding: Require WIDOT to provide more funding up front through operational reimbursement and incentivizing improvements.
- 445 54) Balanced & Fair Partnership Between Digesters, Gas Recovery Programs & Utility Companies: Create a 446 statewide reimbursement competitive grant program to enhance and fund bioenergy projects.
- 447 55) Lead Pollution: Support statewide/Utility User funding to help local governments mitigate lead contamination in 448 drinking water.
- 449 56) **Public Trust Doctrine:** Oppose legislation that erodes the Public Trust Doctrine and DNR's ability to regulate 450 navigable waters.
- 451 57) Climate Change: Support legislative efforts to address climate change. Enhance county authority and funding 452 for county-level action planning, mitigation, adaptation, and resilience around the impacts of climate change, including
- 453 climate change influenced by human activity.454

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Local Government Services

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 457 1) Fees/Licenses: State-set fees collected by counties should fairly cover administrative costs.
- 458 2) Libraries: Enforce compliance with WI Stats. 43.24(6) which require state funding for public library systems at 13%
 459 of local library expenditures.
- 3) Legislative Mandates: Oppose any state or federal legislation or rules/regulations promulgated by federal or state agencies that would require counties to provide a service or administer any program without adequate and on-going funding; support creation of a Joint Survey Committee on Local Mandates. Support legislation to allow waivers from state mandates.
- 464 4) **Association Memberships**: Amend WI Stats. 59.07(27) to require a simple majority vote of the county board of supervisors to purchase membership in an association of county boards.
- 5) **Utility Deregulation**: Oppose any deregulation that leads to higher consumer rates. Any attempts to restructure the delivery of electricity should address: reliability of electrical service, equitable benefits to large and small rate payers, the social and environmental impacts of restructuring and the ability of counties to aggregate to purchase electricity.
- 470 6) **Room Tax**: Amend the room tax statutes to include counties.
- Alliant Energy Center District: Provide enabling legislation or a grandfather clause within the Wisconsin Center
 District and Bradley Center agreement to extend the same authority to the Alliant Energy Center.
- 8) County Board Elections: Change the state statutes requiring County Board members to be sworn in on the third
 Tuesday to allow the seating of temporary Board members until a recount is completed.
- 475 9) TABOR/Property Tax Freeze: Urge state to pay for required programs to reduce property tax growth, not pass
 476 more constitutional amendments.
- 477 10) Offshore Contracting: Oppose the practice of contracting state of Wisconsin government functions or services to478 overseas companies/operations.
- 479 11) Local Government Control: Oppose any legislation that limits or deletes local government control including480 opposition to levy limits and support for county home rule authority.
- 481 12) Reverse Marriage Ban: Support a constitutional amendment to delete the marriage ban amendment adopted in
 482 the Fall '06 General Election.
- 483 13) **Domestic Partnership Benefits**: Continue to allow local governments to provide domestic partner benefits.
- 484 14) **State Contracts**: Require the State to award contracts to vendors that extend spousal benefits to include 485 employees in domestic partner relationships.
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- 489 leases, allow the purchase of communities by residents and the development of co-operative housing for manufactured490 housing communities.
- 491 16) **Grant Program Continuity**: Require that when the state awards contracts or otherwise funds a project, the state 492 should require sustainability as one criterion in the decision-making or contract selection process.

- 493 17) **Buy Local**: Provide and maintain state funding to create incentives for businesses and all levels of government to
- 494 buy local produce and products.
- 495 18) Arts Funding: Support increased funding for the arts across Wisconsin.
- 496 19) **Restore Impact Fee Authority**: Restore counties to the governmental entities that are authorized to levy impact 497 fees.
- 498 20) Affordable Housing Trust Fund: Support enabling legislation to allow Dane County to create an Affordable 499 Housing Trust Fund.
- 500 21) **Dangerous Animals and Vicious Dog Ordinance**: Amend state law to allow counties to enact stricter ordinances to regulate dangerous animals and vicious dogs having countywide applicability.
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- 505 23) Support Wisconsin Workers' Rights to Organize and Collectively Bargain: Dane County is committed to a fair and respectful bargaining process and in bargaining in good faith with our employees, even if state statutes no longer require collective bargaining between Dane County and its employees. Oppose attacks on workers' rights.
- 508 24) **Population Change**: Dane is nearing the 500,000 population mark. Support legislation to address issues within 509 the state statutes that pertain to counties with a population of 500,000 or more (Milwaukee County) by changing the 510 population figure to 750,000 or more throughout the state statutes. There are 160 provisions in state law that apply to counties that size. One of the most problematic provisions, the state takeover of Dane County child welfare services, would cost county taxpayers \$58.8 million.
- 513 25) **In-State Tuition for Immigrants**: Support restoring the law for in-state tuition for state residents who graduated from a Wisconsin High School, but lack proper immigration documentation.
- 515 26) **Flood Insurance Threat**: Oppose any proposal to suspend state floodplain rules that nullify federal flood 516 insurance and jeopardize federal disaster assistance for Wisconsin flood victims.
- 517 27) UW Cooperative Extension's Relationship with Dane County Extension Department and Wisconsin Idea
 518 Partnership: Support Wisconsin Idea Partnership to address funding reductions to UW System through the budget bill
 519 and the impacts that the Badger Partnership will create for UW Extension and its partnerships with county extension
 520 agencies, including the Dane County Extension Department
- 521 28) Changes to Wisconsin Redistricting Statutes: Oppose changes to the redistricting process that allow the 522 Wisconsin Legislature to develop a map of Congressional, Senatorial and Assembly districts prior to local government 523 input regarding ward boundaries.
- 524 29) **Collective Bargaining Rights**: Support workers having the right to seek safe working conditions, benefits and 525 fair pay through collective bargaining and oppose legislation that weakens it.
- 526 30) Online Retailers Sales Tax: Support legislation requiring online retailers with Wisconsin ties to collect and remit
 527 WI State and local sales tax.
 528 31) Reduce Holding Period for Unclaimed Animals from 7 to 3 Days: Change state law to reduce the unclaimed
- 528 31) Reduce Holding Period for Unclaimed Animals from 7 to 3 Days: Change state law to reduce the unclaimed
 529 animal holding period from 7 to 3 days. This would shorten the County/Humane Society holding contract and allow the
 530 Dane County Humane Society to place an animal up for adoption much sooner.
- 531 32) Fair and Equitable Taxation: Support fair and equitable taxation without harming county revenue.
- 532 33) Public Funding for Elections: Support public funding/financing for local/state elections.
- 533 34) School Choice Expansion: Oppose any legislation/action to expand the voucher program or a similar facsimile 534 in the Madison Metropolitan School District or in any Dane County school system.
- 535 35) **Oppose State-Imposed County Board Restructuring**: Oppose legislation that impedes a County Board from 536 governing, budgeting and hiring staff.
- 537 36) Tenants' Rights: Oppose legislation that prohibits local governments from enacting/enforcing ordinances that
 538 regulate landlord/tenant relations which enhance fairness in landlord/tenant relations, foster responsible property
 539 ownership and protect the safety & stability of neighborhoods.
- 540 37) **Collective Bargaining**: Support legislation allowing local government the option to engage in collective 541 bargaining with public sector employees.
- 542 38) **UW Hospital & Clinics (UWHC)**: Support restoring the rights of workers at UWHC.
- 543 39) **Student Debt**: Support legislation to lower student debt by any means possible including refinancing loans, 544 implementing tax breaks for those paying back the loans, reducing interest rates and ensuring tuition is affordable.
- 545 40) Nonpartisan Redistricting: Support legislation to require a nonpartisan system for redistricting legislative and 546 congressional districts in the state. Dane County voters approved by 82.1% yes votes and 17.9% no votes.
- 547 41) Wisconsin Arts Agency: The state shall fully fund and create a free-standing Wisconsin Arts Agency to enhance
 548 the lives of youth, older adults and all Wisconsin citizens by funding art projects in Communities, Schools, Colleges
 549 and Public Works/Building construction across the state.
- 42) Rural Broadband Coverage: Urge the State of Wisconsin to increase financial support/seek federal funding to
 expand broadband services to underserved rural areas.
