4 **AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT TO ACCEPT GRANT FUNDING FOR THE PURCHASE**

6 Homeland Security (HS) and Wisconsin Department of Military Affairs (DMA), is
7 providing grant funding to support Wisconsin Emergence Management (WEM), Aligned Law
8 Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) Initiative, Dane County Sheriff's Office Tactical
9 Response Team, for the purchase of rural marksman equipment, Grant Number 2022-HSW-
10 02A-13094; funding is available November 14, 2022, through May 5, 2023.

12 Grant funding, in the amount of \$3,500, will provide for the purchase of binoculars with
13 integrated range finders. This equipment shall be used to acquire accurate information during
14 critical incidents including search and rescue efforts and to scanning terrain effectively and
15 efficiently. The use of binoculars with integrated range finders improves communication and
16 decision making during intense uncertain and rapidly changing critical incidents, enhancing
17 safety for law enforcement officers and the public.

19 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the on behalf of the County of Dane, the
20 County Executive is authorized to execute an agreement embodying the above provisions;
21 and Sheriff's Office is authorized to accept \$3,500 from Wisconsin DMA, WEM/HS ALERT to
22 purchase binoculars with integrated range finders; and

Agreement Articles for Federal Fiscal Year 2022 Homeland Security Awards

Article I - Summary Description of Award

The purpose of the FY 2022 HSGP is to support state and local efforts to prevent terrorism and other catastrophic events and to prepare the Nation for the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United States. The HSGP provides funding to implement investments that build, sustain, and deliver the 32 core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal of a secure and resilient Nation. Among the five basic homeland security missions noted in the DHS Quadrennial Homeland Security Review, HSGP supports the goal to Strengthen National Preparedness and Resilience. The building, sustainment, and delivery of these core capabilities are not exclusive to any single level of government, organization, or community, but rather, require the combined effort of the whole community. This HSGP award consists of State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) funding in the amount of \$4,847,500. This grant program funds a range of activities, including planning, organization, equipment purchase, training, exercises, and management and administration across all core capabilities and mission areas.

Article II - DHS Standard Terms and Conditions Generally

- (3) all construction materials are manufactured in the United States--this means that all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States. The Buy America preference only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, or affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project, but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project.

Waivers

When necessary, recipients may apply for, and the agency may grant, a waiver from these requirements.

If ground disturbing activities occur during construction, applicant will monitor ground disturbance, and if any potential archeological resources are discovered the applicant will immediately cease work in that area and notify the pass-through entity, if applicable, and DHS/FEMA.

Article XLIV - Applicability of DHS Standard Terms and Conditions to Tribes
