In recent years a growing national movement has emerged to reform ineffective fine and fee policies that drive racial injustice, economic inequality, and mass criminalization.

FINANCIAL JUSTICE IN CRIMINAL JUSTICE

- Develop and implement doable solutions

### AREAS OF REFORM

- Fees imposed on incarcerated people
- Debt-based driver's license suspensions
- Court debt and other court-related fines/fees
- Municipal fines and fees

### FEES IMPOSED ON INCARCERATED PEOPLE

### ALLEGHENY COUNTY, PA

- Established a \$100 monthly stipend for incarcerated people from a fund earmarked for "inmate welfare" to use to pay for phone calls and commissary items.
- Working to introduce an ordinance that would eliminate profits made off of incarcerated people by passing a \$15/hr minimum wage for incarcerated workers and pushing to make jail phone calls free.

#### PHILADELPHIA, PA

- Provide funding for 165 minutes of free phone calls each week for incarcerated people
- Eliminate commissary markups
- Make phone calls and commissary items more accessible and affordable; support them to maintain connections to their support networks and ensure they have necessary hygiene and food items

### **COHORT 2 APPLICATION PERIOD**

- Dane County participated in the March 3<sup>rd</sup> 4<sup>th</sup> CCFFJ Bootcamp

- Invitation to apply completed in early April
- Next round of applications expected in early May
- Initiative launches in July 2022
- Grant funding between \$25,000 \$75,000, customized technical assistance, access to a network of subject matter experts, reform implementation planning, communications strategy support, and opportunities for shared learning.
- Learning site teams are 2-5 team members, including: team coordinator, county stakeholders and representatives, community advocates, and people with lived experience
