Good morning -

I write to you in support of Agenda item #12 tonight, regarding 2021 Res-157 about the Dane County Mask Mandate.

I unfortunately can't attend the meeting tonight due to prior commitments, but I've spread the word far & wide (within Dane County) to friends, family, neighbors, business owners - to encourage them to attend or at least email their support of this resolution introduced by Weigand (big thanks to Weigand for bringing this resolution to the table).

Why is it that PHMDC is still allowed to keep pushing these mandates? They are not elected officials.

What will it take for them to stop extending these mandates? They keep moving the goal post. The public is losing faith in them, and in you - the board - to make common-sense, logical decisions & help us move on from this.

Why do you keep letting them extend these mandates? You are elected officials. Do what you were elected to do - represent your constituents, business-owners & individuals alike.

In the mandate, Ms. Heinrich says per Statute 252.03(1) she has authority - but that talks about communicable diseases NOT viruses, and says the health officials report to the "appropriate governing body" - which is you.

I have family all throughout the state - and **no other counties in the state have mask mandates like Dane County.** I know I've been fortunate, but a number of my ELDERLY and IMMUNOCOMPROMISED family members NATURALLY had covid, were NOT hospitalized, and they're fine. And they don't wear masks, they don't forego seeing loved ones (never have), we've had family gatherings and they were NOT super spreaders. Even others talk to me like living in Dane County is a punishment - no lie. They don't want to come visit Dane County because of our draconian rules. But guess what - Dane County residents travel all over the state & county & don't wear masks when they go other places, and they don't become super spreaders. So how is it that when they come back to Dane County they magically need to wear masks to stay healthy, even though they've been healthy everywhere else WITHOUT a mask? Wearing a mask is not normal.

And we're no longer in an emergency state. An emergency is "an urgent, sudden, and serious event or an unforeseen change in circumstances that necessitates immediate action to remedy harm or avert IMMINENT danger to life, health, or property." Imminent is defined as "ready to take place; happening soon." If we truly were in an emergency state to justify mask requirements, then EVERY person not wearing a mask would VERY SOON fall ill with covid - no matter what. And that's so not the case. Therefore danger is NOT IMMINENT, and DOES NOT constitute an emergency. If it were imminent, I'd know people left & right who'd been hospitalized over it (especially my non-masking family & friends) and even died - but yet I personally don't know any friends or family who've been hospitalized or died over this. Again, not imminent.

You can't just keep relying on the number of "testing positive for covid" cases. Because this is a virus - the original intent was never to CURE COVID - it was to "slow the spread/flatten the curve" so that hospitals could keep up. Why can't hospitals keep up? It's not just because they're overwhelmed with covid patients - that's NOT it. Hospitals are short-staffed (they were short-staffed when pandemic began) especially with new vaccine mandates. Then you compound that with all the OTHER hospital needs (emergency surgeries, people putting off medical attention until it's too late), and you get overwhelmed. Here are links:

And many people have now reached herd immunity - yes REAL herd immunity - and they have very little risk of re-infection. Even if they do it, they won't get sick enough to be hospitalized. And honestly - do you freak out anytime you hear of someone getting the flu? But it comes back every year & people test positive for it. There's no cure for the flu, but it DOES kil people too. But no you don't freak out over the flu - you just figure anyone sick with flu needs to stay home & suffer through sniffles or whatever for a few days, then they'll bounce back. That's all that positive covid tests are showing (except in extreme circumstances where people are hospitalized, altho covid may not be the only cause for them to be here). This comment is in regards to 2021 RES-157 Urging the Director of Public Health Madison Dane County to Pull Back Her Emergency Order Until Public Input and the Consent of the Governed Has Been Achieved

SYNTHETIC "messenger" RNA (called mRNA), which causes the cells to create toxic proteins called spike proteins; the synthetic RNA is resistant to enzymes that would normally break it down. The mRNA inactivates tumor-suppressing proteins, meaning it can promote cancer.

MONOBASIC POTASSIUM PHOSPHATE can cause blood in the urine, blurred vision, burning, crawling, itching, numbness, prickling, "pins and needles" or tingling feelings, changes in skin color, chest pain or discomfort, confusion, decreased or increased urination, dizziness, irregular heartbeat, fever, mood or mental changes, muscle cramps, nausea, nervousness, numbness and tingling, seizures, sweating, trouble breathing, unusual tiredness or weakness, and vomiting.

DIBASIC SODIUM PHOSPHATE DEHYDRATE can cause permanent impairment of kidney function leading to long-term dialysis.

POTASSIUM CHLORIDE is also used as the third drug in the "three-drug cocktail" for executions by lethal injection because it causes cardiac arrest.

Covid-19 and the 5g Connection

Myths and Truths about Covid-19 Deadly Virus? or 59 Microwave Technology?

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Myths and Truths about Covid-19

MYTH: The disease called Covid-19 is just a mild version of the flu

TRUTH: Covid-19 can be a very serious disease, especially in the elderly and those with pre-existing conditions such as diabetes and heart disease. Many symptoms of Covid, including lack of oxygen, fizzing feelings, swelling of the extremities, tendency to form clots, and inability to smell or taste, do not occur with ordinary flu.

MYTH: Covid-19 is caused by a deadly virus.

TRUTH: Researchers have never properly isolated and characterized any "virus" said to cause disease. "Viruses" do not attack and "take over" our cells from the outside. Rather, extremely small, round bundles of RNA in a protein shell, called exosomes, form *inside* cells when the cells are under stress; these exosomes play helpful roles in detoxification and adjustment to the environment, actually protecting us against disease.

MYTH: Covid-19 is a contagious disease.

TRUTH: A study in Wuhan, China looked at data on almost ten million residents who took part in a screening program between May 14 and June 1, 2020. Out of these, three hundred tested positive but had no symptoms. Researchers followed these cases and noted that out of over one thousand close contacts of the asymptomatic positive cases, they all tested negative and none got sick. Researchers have yet to carry out studies with symptomatic sufferers—to expose sick people to healthy volunteers and see what happens as public health authorities did for the Spanish flu in 1918. In that 1918 study, not a single healthy person became sick from exposure to those suffering from the Spanish flu.

MYTH: Masking and lockdowns have helped prevent disease and death.

TRUTH: States that have not required masking and lockdowns have had the same or lower rates of disease and death, compared to those that have required masking and lockdowns. New York, which has severe lockdown and masking measures, has a death rate of 274 per 100,000 while Florida, with no statewide masking requirement and only a short lockdown, has a death rate of 183 per 100,000—and Florida has a far higher percentage of elderly and retirees than New York. In Europe, the daily death rates are 50 times higher in Spain, 44 times higher in the U.K., and 22 times higher in France—all countries that imposed masking and lockdowns—compared to Sweden, which has no lockdown, no masking requirements, open schools and open businesses.

MYTH: Wearing a mask can protect you against Covid. TRUTH: More than a dozen credible medical studies prove that face masks do not work, even in hospital settings! Even if Covid-19 were caused by a virus (which it is not), the pores on the recommended masks are ten times bigger than any so-called virus.

MYTH: Wearing a mask poses no danger.

TRUTH: Analysis of face masks worn by children found eleven dangerous bacterial and fungal pathogens on the masks. Masks also reduce oxygen levels leading to headaches, reduced immunity, hypoxia and brain cell death.

MYTH: The PCR test can accurately determine the presence of Covid-19.

TRUTH: The PCR test is designed to identify small samples of genetic material using amplification cycles; it was not designed to diagnose disease. When a sample of nasal material is amplified 40 times, the results are usually positive; when the sample is amplified only 30 times, the results are usually negative. Thus, health officials can stipulate the number of amplification cycles to get the results they want, such as showing that the unvaccinated are testing positive and the vaccinated are testing negative. One Florida lab set the number of cycles so high that 100 percent of the tests came back positive!

MYTH: About 70 percent of Americans are fully vaccinated. TRUTH: The Kaiser Family Foundation reported that as of May 11, 2021, the average vaccine uptake in the U.S. was just 32 percent. Most states have huge inventories of vaccines about to expire—hence the recent push for vaccine mandates.

MYTH: The Covid vaccine can prevent infection and transmission of SARS-CoV-2

TRUTH: In trials for the vaccine, manufacturers used statistical manipulation to claim that the vaccines had a 50 percent efficacy in preventing serious symptoms. They did not prove that vaccines could prevent infection and transmission. In a July 2021 outbreak in Provincetown, Massachusetts, 74 percent of those infected and diagnosed were fully vaccinated. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) then stated that Covid shots do not prevent Covid infection and transmission.

MYTH: Vaccines for Covid-19 are safe.

TRUTH: A leaked confidential document reveals that Covid vaccine maker Moderna received 300,000 reports of side effects after just a three-month period following the launch of their vaccine. Side effects are similar to those of Covid-19 itself and include widespread clots, swelling of the extremities, extreme fatigue, fainting, eye disorders including blindness, tumors, kidney problems, skin problems, paralysis, stroke, abnormal menstrual bleeding, birth defects and miscarriage. As of July 18, 2021, the European Union's database shows 17,503 deaths and 1.7 million injuries (50 percent serious) from the vaccines. As of July 23, 2021, U.K. data indicate that fully vaccinated people are 65 percent more likely to be hospitalized and 1540 percent more likely to die from Covid-19 compared to unvaccinated people. In the U.S., as of August 2021, the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS) has received 13,068 reports of death and 595,622 reports of adverse events following the vaccine. (It's estimated that only about 1-10 percent of deaths and reactions are reported to VAERS.) About 360,000 U.S. teens age twelve to seventeen have developed myocarditis (swelling of the heart) after vaccination, many requiring hospitalization.

MYTH: Ninety-nine percent of new Covid-19 deaths are in the unvaccinated.

TRUTH: This claim, made by the Associated Press, June 24, hinges on mislabeling everyone who isn't fourteen days past a second dose of vaccine as "unvaccinated." Most vaccine reactions and deaths occur within days of the vaccination, but the article labels these as "unvaccinated." In Israel, nearly 50 percent of new Covid patients are fully vaccinated. Analysis of recent CDC data shows that the number of cases among the vaccinated is 26 percent higher than the unvaccinated, and that 80 percent of the total hospitalized in the U.S. for Covid were vaccinated, while 20 percent were unvaccinated.

MYTH: Remdesivir is a good drug to take for Covid-19. TRUTH: Promoted by Dr. Fauci of the NIH, Remdesivir is a toxic pharmaceutical drug that causes kidney poisoning and other organ damage. Side effects include the lungs filling with fluid—attributed to Covid but actually a dangerous side effect of Remdesivir. Meanwhile, hospitlals have withheld natural, effective treatments for Covid-19.

Dear Mayor Rhodes-Conway:

I was heartened to see funding for Safe Communities in your 2022 executive budget. Thank you. Until your budget was released, I wasn't sure how MedDrop, the African American Opioid Coalition, Stop the Overdose Epidemic Steering Committee, participation in Vision Zero, and injury prevention work generally, would continue next year. I'm afraid these programs remain in jeopardy, however, unless action is taken to prevent Public Health Madison/Dane County from diverting \$113,276 away from priorities outlined in your executive budget.

Last month, Public Health authorized release of an RFP through City Purchasing that effectively guts city and county support for injury prevention. Through this RFP, Public Health repurposed \$113,276 of funding designated by policy makers for Injury Prevention (\$20,000); MedDrop (\$15,000) and Drug Poisoning Prevention (\$78,276). According to the RFP, these funds will be awarded to one or more agencies for substance use prevention activities to be conducted during the 2022 fiscal year, with an option for a 2 year extension.

Preventing substance misuse is critical to a safe, healthy community, and is a component of Safe Communities' work. However, the new initiative should not come at the cost of support for injury prevention activities with a proven track record. Redirecting these funds amounts to a decision to abandon an initiative founded by City of Madison and Dane County leaders 22 years ago -- an initiative that has saved hundreds of lives from preventable injuries.

Injury prevention is a core public health function, and now more than ever, we need champions. Currently, local health care systems are engaged in their Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) review cycle. All are ramping up their focus on injury prevention, based on data showing an alarming rise in traffic crashes and overdoses, and continued concern over elder falls and suicides. I am hopeful that, by re-committing to injury prevention, the city and county will continue to play a leadership role at this critical juncture.

Here is what is at stake should city and county funding for injury prevention be eliminated.

- The nation's only African American Opioid Coalition. This coalition of African American leaders is addressing a spike in overdose deaths among Dane County's African American community.
- Neighborhood-based traffic safety campaigns, including free distribution of slow down yard signs and coordination of the pedestrian flag/Artful Crossings program.
- Suicide prevention and substance use recovery supports for Dane County's Latino community, including Spanish language call-in programs on LaMovida and virtual suicide prevention trainings
- MedDrop -- partnerships to coordinate and promote safe, environmentally friendly disposal of unused medicines.
- Stop the Overdose Epidemic Initiative -- award winning partnership to engage health care and treatment providers, peers, law enforcement and fire/EMS, youth and older adult-serving agencies in coordinated prevention, harm reduction and substance use recovery efforts.
- Elder falls prevention: our number one cause of injury hospitalization and significant factor in loss of independence for area older adults

I am concerned that city/county financial support is ending: 1) without your assent; and 2) while the Mayor's

executive budget still reflects a commitment to this programming. It is my understanding that these funds are slated to be awarded before the city's 2022 budget is adopted, a decision made without any deliberation by the Board of Health or elected leadership. An issue of this importance should not be undertaken unilaterally by any agency. I ask that you continue to fund these critical injury prevention services in the city's 2022 budget and beyond.

Dear Dane County Supervisors and Public Health,

Parents, grandparents, care-givers and students are saddened, disappointed and disgusted by last weeks decision to extend the Dane County mask order. PHMDC LIED to parents, superintendents, school boards and, most importantly, kids. Many of our teenagers were days away from having the same CHOICE, EQUAL treatment and health care rights as their high school peers outside of this county. My teenagers deserve and demand the same treatment in their public school.

Do you know that close to 80% of WI School Districts now offer a MASK OPTIONAL policy to all 4K-12 or some portion/grades in their district (and have since June or Sept)? We are more than three months into the school year in this county. Has anyone checked on these hundreds of WI schools, these thousands of students and staff that don't have mask mandates but rather mask CHOICE? How are these students doing? Should we not examine the active control group - isn't this SCIENCE?

I will end my email today with an alarming statement made last week by a doctor in our mental health community. Just days ago another teenager committed suicide in the Dane County suburb of McFarland. We've lost more children to suicide in this county than we will ever lose over COVID. Please stop and think about the mental, physical, psycho-social and academic harm the YEAR of forced masking is having on just our kids. Where is the fairness, the choice? Why are you punishing someone because of the zip code they live in or the public school they attend?

I am not able to make this important meeting, but please share my comments below with your members. . I have emailed several of the Dane County Supervisors with these same thoughts. Only 3 of you have responded.

Dear Chair Halverson and Members of the Board of Health of Madison and Dane County:

I am writing on behalf of the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association (HSVMA) to convey our strong support for ending the practice of declawing cats in Madison unless medically necessary to treat a physical illness, injury or disease. HSVMA is a national association of approximately 9,000 veterinary professionals including 225 Wisconsin members—focused on the health and welfare of all animals, including companion cats.

Declawing is a painful, invasive surgery—a series of 10-18 separate amputations of the last bones of a cat's toes. Contrary to widely-held belief, declawing is not simply removal of nails. It is typically performed for convenience and to avoid possible damage to household items. However, declawing exposes the patient to risks of anesthesia, infection and blood loss, as well as chronic pain, nerve damage and lameness.

Research has repeatedly indicated a high post-operative complication rate of 50%. A 2001 study published in the *Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association* found that 33% of cats suffer at least one behavioral problem after declaw or tendonectomy surgery. The study showed that 17.9% of declawed cats had an increase in biting frequency or intensity and that 15.4% would not use a litter box. Tragically, these are the primary behavioral reasons why cats are relinquished to shelters, where many face euthanasia. A prominent 2017 study in the *Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery* found that 63% of declawed cats had painful bone fragments remaining after surgery. This led to further exacerbation of permanent side effects, including back pain and litter box avoidance.

Scratching is a normal feline behavior. It removes dead husks from cats' claws, marks territory, and stretches muscles. Where scratching may be a problem, HSVMA advocates the use of humane alternatives. These are better not only for the cats'

health, but also for cat owners who are often not informed about the common, expensive, frustrating and potentially dangerous consequences of this misguided surgical procedure. Sensible alternatives include well-selected scratching posts, alternative furniture selection or placement, nail trims, training, and nail caps.

HSVMA joins the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) and American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) in strongly opposing convenience declawing. Declawing has already been prohibited in dozens of countries worldwide. In 2019 New York became the first to implement a statewide ban prohibiting convenience declawing. If this declaw ban is enacted, Madison will join twelve other U.S. cities—Austin, TX; Denver, CO; St. Louis, MO; Pittsburgh, PA and Los Angeles, San Francisco, Santa Monica, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, Burbank, Culver City and West Hollywood, CA—in prohibiting this inhumane surgical procedure.

We strongly urge you and your colleagues on the Board of Health of Madison and Dane County to demonstrate your humane leadership by prohibiting cat declawing in Madison. Thank you.

Sincerely, Hannah One year ago, many kids were still attending school virtually. Parents stood up advocated for their kids but were told over and over again, "Kids are resilient." And while some kids were resilient, far too many were not. Educational gaps widened and depression and anxiety soared.

There was such a singular focus on the physical impacts of covid that everything else was largely ignored. Social development, quality education and emotional and mental health were forced down on the scale of importance and kids paid the price. We need to learn from that but I'm not sure we have.

While your child and my child might be okay with masks, not all children are and many of them probably can't vocalize it. Children who were already disproportionally affected by virtual schooling are again put at a disadvantage due to masks. English Language learners rely far more heavily than we do on visual clues such as lip reading to understand and learn. What about children with IEPs for Speech and Language Development, children who already struggled reading social cues before the pandemic, kids with sensory processing disorders and those with hearing impairments? And what about all the four and five year olds trying to learn their letter sounds while they can't see their teachers' mouth and she/he can't see theirs? Masks add additional hurdles for teachers whose jobs are already getting harder each year.

I also worry about the development of babies and toddlers who are in masked daycares all day. Around eight months of age, a baby's focus moves from the eyes of the person they are looking at to their mouth as visual speech clues help them develop their speech and language skills. Have you thought about how masks will impact these babies? Once again, your kid might be okay but someone else's might face language and development delays.

I'm certified to teach birth- 3rd grade in Wisconsin. The importance and impact of quality early childhood education cannot be overstated. We don't yet know the severity of effects long-term mask wearing will have on learning but given everything we know about how kids develop and learn, it's common sense to assume that some children will be negatively impacted. And is it really worth the risk? In Dane County, there have been 4,060 children test positive for covid in the 5-11 age range. Of those, 11 have been hospitalized and zero have died. I am worried that the cost of wearing masks is not worth the benefits, especially for those students who are most vulnerable. It has been far long enough and the high vaccination rate we have in Dane County should count for something.

Greetings Madison and Dane County Board of Health and Council Members-

Thank you in advance for your time in reading my email regarding Proposed Ordinance #67344 to end elective cat declawing; as a Dane County resident I am in strong support of this ordinance. Let's all just take a minute to look down at our hands, fingers outstretched. See that joint just below your fingernail? Now imagine having that whole piece of each your fingers cut off, no finger nail, no finger tips. This is what declawing is, amputating the last joint, not just simply 'removing a claw'. Now imagine living your life without having the tactile dexterity of your hands with those gone. Unable to navigate your world how you were meant to, or touching and feeling the warmth of your loved ones. When we do this to cats, we are selfishly depriving them of a multisensory factor of their life and arguably, what makes a cat 'a cat'.

If we are truly concerned about public health, then we need to be against declawing. A cat will give behavioral cues about their boundaries; some of which are subtle. However, if those indicators are not intelligible by the viewer, the claws are then used to communicate that a boundary is being crossed and needs to be respected. If you take that option away from them, they will learn that their next best option may be to bite. I think anyone in the public health community would agree that a cat bite is far worse than a scratch. For another reason, there is neuropathic pain endured post amputation that can cause litterbox misusage due to the pain of trying to dig or having those granules push on now tender areas. Chronic pain is noted in 80% of people who have undergone amputations (https://www.amputee-coalition.org/chronicpain/). Also, if a cat can't scent mark through normal scratching behavior on scratching posts (they have scent glands in their feet) they may choose to scent mark in other ways, possibly by urination or defecation outside litterboxes. This can lead to owners getting angry and upset at this occurring, this then increases stress and induced fear in the household, which again may illicit aggression. Whose life is this benefiting?

There is just no excuse or reason for this to still be in practice. This day and age there are ample resources available to deter any unwanted behavior such as videos online, video behaviorist consultations, books, cheap cat furniture/scratching alternatives, and behavior modifiers you can readily search and buy off of amazon. How is surgically modifying/mutilating an animal still a standard practice? Would we be ok with an owner electing to remove all of their dog's teeth because they nipped at their child who pulled its tail? Or how about amputating a hind leg of a dog to keep it from jumping onto the bed? Where do we draw the line, as the above examples as well as declawing, are all major surgical modifications to an animal's natural state for the mere 'perceived' convenience of modifying a behavior.

We need to stop looking at cats like material objects within our households that we can choose to alter to our whim out of mere convenience, and finally start to look at them like the family members they are, that also experience pain, fear, contentment, and also enjoy play just as we do.

Anti-declawing is a worldwide movement, it is banned in entire nations and countries including Europe, Germany, Brazil, Australia, and many others. It is catching and gaining ground in the United States as well with it now banned in the entire state of New York amongst many other cities throughout the country. Madison and Dane County is a great progressive place to live and is why I have resided here in Dane county for the last 28 years. I strongly urge you to vote yes on this ban, to prove not only to our country, but to the world, that we are leaders and indeed one of the best places to live as we respect and put our animal's welfare over materialistic convenience.

Dear Members of the Board of Health:

The Paw Project strongly supports Legislative File #67344, which will prohibit the inhumane and unnecessary practice of declawing in Madison. The Paw Project is a national nonprofit, veterinarian-run organization that has worked for 20 years to end declawing. Declawing is, most commonly, a series of amputations of all or most of the last bone of each of an animal's toes performed to prevent unwanted scratching. Declawing removes an integral part of an animal's anatomy and subjects animals to the risks of pain, infection, behavioral changes, and lifelong lameness. Safe and effective alternatives to declawing include simple training and other established deterrent methods. We urge you to vote YES on this proposed ordinance.

Declawing is common in the US and Canada, but it is illegal or considered unethical by veterinarians in most countries. The Paw Project partnered with New York Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal to pass the nation's first statewide declaw ban in July 2019. There are active anti-declaw bills in NJ, MA, PA, and CA in 2021. In recent years, public opinion regarding declawing has evolved due to educational campaigns and published evidence exposing the harmful effects of declawing. Eight cities in California, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Burbank, Santa Monica, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, West Hollywood, and Culver City, have prohibited declawing. Denver, CO, Austin, TX, Pittsburgh PA, and St. Louis, MO are other US cities to ban declawing. In the past three years, declawing has been prohibited in eight of ten Canadian provinces, Nova Scotia, British Columbia, Newfoundland and Labrador, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Prince Edward Island.

The American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) forbids its certified Cat Friendly practices from performing declaw surgery. The AAFP states, "There is no current peer-reviewed data definitively proving that cats with destructive behavior are more likely to be euthanized, abandoned or relinquished. The decision (by veterinarians) of whether or not to declaw should not be impacted by these considerations." VCA and Banfield Hospitals, which operate many clinics in Wisconsin, will not perform declawing, which they consider below standard of care."

Much evidence exists that behavioral changes following declawing can result in the relinquishment of animals to shelters. The CDC and NIH advise pet owners to "not declaw" their animals since declawing is not an effective means of preventing opportunistic disease in immunocompromised individuals.

In 2018, a peer-reviewed scientific article in the *Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery* reported that "declawing increases the risk of long-term or persistent pain, manifesting as unwanted behaviors such as inappropriate elimination (soiling/urinating outside of the litter box) and aggression/biting. This is not only detrimental to the cat (pain is a major welfare issue and these behaviors are common reasons for relinquishment of cats to shelters), but also has health implications for their human companions, as cat bites can be serious."

We proudly support this ordinance, which will greatly protect animals and will end declawing in Madison.

I am writing in support of proposed ordinance 67344. I am the chief medical officer for external affairs at Mars Veterinary Health, which operates VCA, Banfield, and BluePearl animal hospitals across the country. I have practiced nearly 45 years and have seen many progressive changes in veterinary medicine over the years. I am a firm believer that the time has come to stop all elective declaw procedures in the United States. I am happy to have lead the decision by VCA, in early 2020, to stop offering declawing procedures in any of our 900 hospitals across 45 states, including in Wisconsin. It was a decision based on current evidence and we reached it after having discussions with our veterinarians all around the country.

Our decision has been embraced and we have not looked back. Our clients are happy knowing that the well-being of their animals is our top priority, our staff are happy knowing that they will not be participating in the potential harming of animals and that they are working in hospitals that follow evidence-based medicine, and our veterinarians are happier knowing that they will no longer feel pressured by a small minority of clients into performing procedures that they are uncomfortable with. Our hospital staff have become well versed on educating pet guardians about how to live with cats that have their claws and about the potential ramifications of declawing which can include chronic pain (paws and back pain), aggressive behavior including biting, and inappropriate soiling. A scientific paper documenting these sequelae was published in 2018 (Pain and adverse behavior in declawed cats; Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery, Vol. 20(4), 280-288).

Declawing is an unnecessary practice. A growing number of cities around the country has either banned declawing or is strongly considering it. Contrary to what some people have thought would happen, there is no evidence that stopping declawing will lead to more relinquishment of cats at animal shelters. To the contrary, the relinquishment numbers are actually higher due to biting and inappropriate soiling/avoidance of litter box use. Declaw bans first went in to effect in our city of

Los Angeles in 2009 (Hollywood, Santa Monica, West Los Angeles) and since then the ban has widened to include all of Greater Los Angeles.

We have found that some clients seek us out because of our no declaw position; they know they can trust us with their animals because we aren't doing unnecessary and harmful surgeries on our patients. We call on all veterinarians to stop declawing cats. We hope that all veterinarians will choose their patients' well-being over profits. We must always focus on the wellbeing of our patients and prevent animal suffering to the best of our ability.

The hundreds of veterinary hospital operated by VCA and Banfield no longer offering declawing. Clinics certified by the American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) and Fear Free are not allowed to declaw.

There is no reason to believe that declawing cats protects human health. The NIH, CDC, US Public Health Service, the Infectious Diseases Society of America, and the Canadian Medical Association, all have specifically stated that the declawing is "not advised," even for the animals of persons who are severely immunocompromised, including those with HIV. This opinion is echoed in statements on declawing published by the AAHA and AAFP.

We hope this ordinance will be successful and be a model for humane legislation in other cities.
