| 15 | (1) Composition. |
| 16 | (a) The Criminal Community Justice Council shall consist of six voting |
| 17 | members: |

| 20 | 3. the sheriff; |
| 21 | 4. the district attorney; |
| 22 | the presiding judge of the circuit court; |
| 23 | 6. the clerk of courts; |

- 51 **(c)** Non-voting members will not be counted for purposes of establishing a guorum.
 - (d) The Community Justice Council shall permit any member of the county board of supervisors to take part in its deliberations and to speak on any agenda item. This includes closed sessions except if the individual supervisor's exclusion is necessary for the purpose of the closed session. Nevertheless, county board of supervisors who are not members of the Community Justice Council shall not vote, shall not be counted in determining whether or not there is a quorum, and may not make or second any motion.

- 141 (f) Section 15.04(2) shall not apply to the subcommittees set forth in sub (3)(e).

 142 (g) all public members of the subcommittees listed in sub(3)(e) shall serve 2

 143 year terms and may receive per diems and mileage per section 15.04(7)(a).

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145 [EXPLANATION: This amendment renames the Criminal Justice Council to the
146 Community Justice Council, expands its membership, and delineates the
147 composition and duties of three (3) subcommittees including two (2) public
148 members for each subcommittee, and provides mileage and per diems for such
149 public members.]
