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Describe the proposed project and state what will be implemented and completed. [70 points]

The DeForest Area Community and Senior Center serves as a common hearth around which individuals come together for common purposes within a culture of caring to improve the quality of life for area residents. Our mission is to provide area residents with a welcoming place to meet, participate and volunteer while promoting independence, self-reliance and well-being for older adults and their families. Case Management is provided to meet the basic needs of our community members who lack supports and advocacy. Nutritional meals are also provided 5 days per week to older adults. The Center provides services to seniors making it possible for them to live as independently as possible. These services include case management, health care referrals, volunteer opportunities, a nutrition site, peer support, local transportation, recreation and more.

Recreational activities provided throughout our organization work to prevent isolation of older adults while increasing social interactions and relationship building. Our staff work diligently to provide interactive, engaging and educational opportunites to increase participation in our programming. Our center is a focal point of essential services and community collaboration for older adults who live in the rural communities of DeForest, Windsor and Vienna. The general public benefits from the nutritional, educational, and recreational programs offered by the DeForest Area Community and Senior Center. These comprehensive programs include inter-generational activities, meaningful volunteer opportunities, transportation through Transit Solutions or RSVP, a congregate and home delivered meals nutrition program, exercise, education and other classes.

We are hopeful that any funding provided would be a supportive addition to our organizations emergency repsonse efforts. Providing a resource for staff to participate in AED, First Aid, and CPR training will ensure that our staff are prepared, trained and educated in order to repsond to an emergency, if needed at our Center. It is imperative that our staff are certificated in these areas to ensure the safety of our participants. We currently have 8 core staff members in need of certification. These are the staff members who interact with our participatns and provide coverage throughout our open hours. Ensuring that we have staff trained and certified any day of the week, in case of an emergency, will provide a sense of safety to not only our team but those who utilize our services. In 2021 we served 1,282 older adults at the Center, potentially, anyone could need assistance at any time. The cost of onsite training is \$116.25 per person. We are confident that any funding provided to our organization would impact the lives of many through increasing our staffs ability to respond and provide necessary supports. Thank you for considering our request.
