## Dane County Criminal Justice Council Pretrial Subcommittee

The Pretrial Services subcommittee of the CJC began in July 2014. A team of Dane County criminal justice stakeholders attended the Pretrial Justice Policy Forum in Washington, D.C. earlier in 2014 and created a recommendation and timelines for the implementation of innovative pretrial practices. Commissioner Todd Meurer was a catalyst to move stakeholders forward in pretrial improvements.

The pretrial subcommittee emphasized the importance of evidence-based decision-making and the use of data and research in the criminal justice system.

These practices can lead to a decrease in the use of pretrial detention by using a validated assessment tool in conjunction with judicial discretion to keep low-risk offenders in the community while awaiting trial.

#### Where we started:

- A 2014 report to Criminal Justice Council outlines the need for support of a comprehensive pretrial services program in Dane County, WI.
- Envisioned functions of a pretrial services program include:
  - Initial, brief screening by law enforcement
  - Alternatives to arrest
  - Comprehensive assessment of those booked in jail using a validated risk and needs assessment tool(s)
  - Early diversion
  - Pretrial monitoring and supervision when appropriate






- CJC-Pretrial subcommittee continued to meet and research best practices in pretrial services.
- Review of current pretrial supervision practices (formally Alternatives to Incarceration Program and/or Bail Monitoring).
- Crafting grant applications and partnerships with Arnold Ventures (formally the John and Laura Arnold Foundation).
- County Board authorizes 1.0 FTE position and .5 LTE position upon receiving grant funds to cover initial personnel costs.





- Dane County Criminal Justice Council receives \$197,000 award from the Arnold Foundation to enhance Dane County research in pretrial.
- First PSA Assessor hired







- Dane County CJC Data Sharing Benchmarks developed and endorsed by CJC in June, 2017
- Data sharing agreement endorsed by criminal justice stakeholders to explore data integration of administrative data in Dane County.







- Wisconsin Evidence-Based Decision Making (EBDM) Initiative Pretrial Pilot Protocol draft report released
- Second PSA Assessor hired
- Dane County begins using the PSA at initial appearance
- Randomized Control Trial (RCT) commences on June 1, 2017






- First PSA quarterly report published, presented to CJC-Pretrial subcommittee providing data on:
  - Demographic profile of in-custody defendants
  - Charge information
  - Holds at arrest
  - A comparison of PSA recommendations and actual release decisions by commissioners

- 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter PSA report released









#### Public Safety Assessment – 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter 2019








#### Public Safety Assessment – 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter 2019

#### Where we are headed:

- PSAs set to print for all in-custody defendants starting January 3, 2020
- Continued research and reporting via the PSA quarterly reports to the CJC-Pretrial Subcommittee
- Ongoing partnership with Access to Justice Lab, Harvard University to analyze results.



#### Recommendations moving forward:

- Disaggregate PSA data points by race, gender, age and charge level.
- Ongoing data and policy analysis for jail stay reductions
- Partnership with the (future) jail population manager
- Enhanced ability to determine supervision dosage level and success rates.
- Disaggregate bail study by race, gender, age.
