## Assumptions: What will need to occur for success?

Respondents that have true remorse and understanding of the harm they caused will be less likely to re-offend. Criminal justice partners will utilize restorative justice practices and processes. Services will have a positive impact on victims, respondents, and community. RJ Practices can reduce re-offending and racial disparities. Community will engage the model through volunteer roles and outreach.

## **External Factors: What could impede success?**

- \*Insufficient funding for CRC Human Service interventions e.g. Mental Health/AODA
- \*Insufficient education, training, and employment opportunities for participants
- \*Insufficient severity of cases or "cherry picking"

  \*Net widening persons who don't complete CRC process receive charges they would not have had if their offense was committed in a jurisdiction without a CRC.
