- Multiple charges & bail amounts 155 Individuals
- Probation hold in addition to bail 29 Individuals
- Felony charges in addition to bail 19 Individuals
- Prob. Revoked in addition to bail 12 Individuals
- Sentenced in addition to bail 10 Individuals
- **Bail less than \$500 10 Individuals**
- Outside hold in addition to bail 1 Individual

* Based on unique bookings rather than individual offenses



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BAIL - ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Domestic Related Charges (Mandatory Arrest) 5 Individuals
- Violation of Restraining Order 2 Individuals
- Resisting or Obstructing 1 Individual
- Disorderly Conduct & Mistreat Animals 1 Individual
- Discharge Body Fluids on Public Worker/Disorderly Conduct 1 Individual



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ACA - Leveraging Partnerships

- The Dane County Sheriff's Office has partnered with other stakeholders to ensure inmates released from custody have access to medical, mental health, and pharmaceutical treatment when they leave our facility.
 - CCS discharge Planner
 - Human Services Re-entry Coordinator
 - Americorps Staff
 - Public Health
 - Community and Faith-based Groups



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Addressing ACA

- Inmates with a definitive release date are assisted by the Re-entry Coordinator or an Americorps staff person in completing an application for healthcare on-line or by phone in advance of release.
- One hundred and sixty-six individuals were contacted between 09/25/14 and 01/16/15.

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The Future? ACA “To Do” list

- Transition to a volunteer-based program
- Identify a process for connecting the unsentenced population to services prior to release.
- Identify and finalize the outcomes and goals of the program



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FACILITY SIZE

➤ The 2014 Needs Assessment and Master Plan

➤ Total Beds proposed 1,033

- Provides Special Needs Housing Alternatives
- Provide for the sight and sound separation of Youthful Offenders (PREA)
- Programming Space

➤ Current Facilities

➤ Total beds 1,013

- No special needs medical and mental health beds
 - Inmates requiring these services are often housed in segregation as a result
- No allowance for youthful offenders
- Inadequate programming and recreation space



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JAIL POPULATION

Since 2009, there has been an overall reduction in population by 255 with an in-house reduction of 335 per day.

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HUBER/WORK RELEASE

- Standing Judicial Order
 - Unless otherwise specifically noted, individuals sentenced in Dane County have Huber
 - Irrespective of Security Class
 - Not all Huber Inmates are minimum security



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JAIL DIVERSION

- Custody Alternative Monitoring Program (CAMP)
 - Electronic monitoring with alcohol monitoring if indicated
- Pathfinders
 - Treatment paired with electronic monitoring and alcohol monitoring if indicated



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JAIL DIVERSION

- Every inmate sentenced to the Dane County Jail with Huber or work release privileges are screened for participation in CAMP or Pathfinders.
- Screening includes:
 - Set Criteria developed by the Sheriff's Office
 - Criminal History
 - Review of Institutional Behavior
- The inability to pay does not preclude an individual from participation.
 - Fees are waived for those individuals whose household income is under the Federal Poverty Level
 - Fees are reduced for those individuals whose household income is more than the Federal Poverty level but less than 185% of the poverty level.



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JAIL POPULATION DYNAMICS

- Expansion of Jail Diversion has had the biggest impact on jail population.
- The use of ordinance citations has resulted in fewer individuals coming to jail.
- Traffic Offenders are not typically brought to jail.
- Municipal Agencies are charged a daily rate for jail bed utilization.



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PROGRAMMING

- Programming is currently provided but is inefficient and ineffective due to limited space.
- It is not evidenced-based.
 - Some programs work, some don't.
 - The ones that work only work when the intervention is applied correctly and to the appropriate population.
 - The programs that work do not work 100% of the time; 30% is a realistic target



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LIFE AND SAFETY

- The CCB is outdated and antiquated
 - Limited sight lines
 - Door Failures
 - The ability to open doors in a emergency in a safe and timely manner is compromised. Doors have failed.
 - Locking mechanisms are failing. Parts are not available and have to be machined.
 - The facility requires continual repair.
 - Staffing is inefficient.
