Executive Summary:

- PROVIDES EXAMPLES OF POTENTIAL BARRIERS TO EXPANDING COMMUNITY GARDENING PROGRAMMING AND INFRASTRUCTURE; AND
- OUTLINES NEXT STEPS THIS PROJECT WILL TAKE PLACE IN PHASE 2 STARTING IN EARLY 2025.




Project Objectives:

- 3. INCREASED COMMUNITY GARDEN ENGAGEMENT DURING THE WINTER

- COMPILED EXISTING DATA
- EVALUATED GAPS IN EXISTING DATA AND PROGRAMMING

Existing Organizations:

"DANE COUNTY ALREADY HAS MANY ORGANIZATIONS THAT ARE DEEPLY INVOLVED WITH COMMUNITY GARDENING."

Rooted:

- Based in Madison, WI
- Committed to promoting healthier, sustainable neighborhoods through learning about and cultivating land and food
- Manages three community centers in Madison
 - Troy Farms, Badger Rock Neighborhood Center, Madison School Farm

Dane County Extension:

- Operates as a function of the University of Wisconsin-Madison and works with the U.S. Department of Agriculture
- Supports educational programming for those experiencing food insecurity.
 - Manages the Dane County Extension Teaching Garden





Current Programming:

"SINCE COMMUNITY GARDENS TEND TO OPERATE DIFFERENTLY FROM GARDEN TO GARDEN, THERE AREN'T ANY STANDARDIZED MEASURES THAT COMMUNITY GARDENS ACROSS THE COUNTY MUST TAKE TO PROMOTE CAMARADERIE AND ENGAGEMENT."



- Educational farm and community garden
- Programming is targeted at youth
- Middle school students learn about gardening
- A regular workshop on connecting with the community during the holidays
- CommUNITY dinners
- A weekly community market
- Cultural cooking workshops
- Gardening workshops



Existing Data (Income):

OUT OF 2,619 RESPONDENTS:

- I,106 GARDENERS REPORTED MAKING 30% OR BELOW THE AREA MEDIAN INCOME (AMI)
- 382 GARDENERS REPORTED MAKING BETWEEN 30-50% OF THE AMI
- 274 GARDENERS REPORTED MAKING BETWEEN 50-80% OF THE AMI
- 516 GARDENERS REPORTED MAKING ABOVE 80% OF THE AMI
- 341 GARDENERS DID NOT REPORT INCOME DATA



Existing Data (Race):

- 25% OF GARDENERS WERE HISPANIC/LATINO;
- 22% WERE ASIAN/SOUTHEAST ASIAN/PACIFIC ISLANDER;
- 6% WERE BLACK/AFRICAN AMERICAN;
- 3% WERE MULTI-RACIAL;
- 1% WERE NATIVE AMERICAN;
- 33% WERE WHITE/CAUCASIAN;
- 1% IDENTIFIED AS OTHER; AND
- 33% DID NOT SPECIFY THEIR RACE.





Recent Initiatives:

"WITH THE EXPANSION OF COMMUNITY GARDENS IN MADISON, OTHER TOWNS IN DANE COUNTY ALSO HAVE BEEN LOOKING TO GROW THEIR NUMBER OF COMMUNITY GARDENS. "

Anderson Farm Center:

- Located in Oregon, WI
- The center is a recent addition to a 310acre farm
- Is a partnership with Rooted, Dane County Parks, Dane County Extension, and the Oregon Food Pantry
- In 2023, the farm grew over 2,000 pounds of fresh produce for three food pantries
- Center works with 17 Hmong families to ensure their access to community gardens and food.
 - Working to create access to transportation and community-building events

Barriers:

- MANY PEOPLE ARE UNAWARE OF THE FACT THAT COMMUNITY GARDENS ARE AN OPTION AVAILABLE TO THEM;
- SOME PEOPLE DON'T KNOW HOW TO GET INVOLVED WITH A COMMUNITY GARDEN;
- THERE IS A LACK OF LEADERSHIP TO CREATE AND/OR RUN THESE GARDENS SUSTAINABLY; AND
- THERE ARE LANGUAGE BARRIERS THAT EXIST THAT PREVENT PEOPLE FROM BEING INVOLVED IN COMMUNITY GARDENS.





Next Steps:

- Categorize gaps and barriers identified in Phase 1
- Distribute a survey to residents, including community gardeners, nongardeners, and those experiencing food insecurity
 - Survey will ask about demographics, current involvement in community gardening, needs, what programming community members would be interested in, additional perceived barriers to accessing community gardens, and respondents' additional ideas for community gardening and engagement.
- Issue a report with our findings and final recommendations
