

<u>Sequential Intercept</u> <u>Model Mapping Report</u> <u>for Dane County</u>

A new kind of low-barrier, 24/7 crisis care facility could:

- Reduce emergency room visits for individuals in a behavioral health crisis
- Reduce the need for involuntary hospitalization
- Improve patient care
- Increase options for jail diversion
- Reduce time spent by LE on emergency detentions




What is a Crisis Triage Center?

Distinguishing features:

- "No wrong door"
 - Voluntary and involuntary
 - Can accept highest acuity individuals (including those who require seclusion or restraint)
 - Immediate access: no referral process (walk-ins and drop-offs)
- Medically managed
 - No medical clearance required
 - Intoxication or risk of withdrawal not a barrier
 - Can address basic medical needs so that these are not a barrier to individuals accessing BH specialty care

Budget initiative to fund the development of a Triage Center

The Implementation Report outlined a proposed model, but uncertainty remained:

- Options and requirements for facility licensure
- Legal implications of accepting involuntary admissions under s. 51.15
- MA billing approach and strategy for covering operational costs



Despite allocations for capitol (\$10M) and operating costs (\$1.5M) in the 2022 County budget, continued uncertainty contributed to there being no responses to a 2023 RFP for a Crisis Triage Center Operator.



The landscape continues to change



Crisis Urgent Care and Observation Facilities (CUCOFs):

- 2023 Wisconsin Act 249 creates a framework for a new type of facility
- State Biennial budget includes \$10M in grant funding to support development of up to two regional CUCOFs
- New administrative rule (DHS 31) will create regulations for licensing and operations
- Advisory Committee convened between August and December 2024 to inform rule writing
- The proposed rule is currently open for <u>public comment</u> on economic impacts



Uncertainty remains

The future of this type of service in Dane County is still uncertain:

- Wisconsin DHS intends to initially certify 1 or 2 CUCOFs
 - No guarantee that one would be sited in Dane County
 - Prioritization for the western region of the state
 - Prioritization for locations at least 100 miles from WMHI
- CUCOFs to be independently certified (not county-based)
- State grant funding will support start-up of initial CUCOFs, but MA reimbursement model is not yet determined





What next?



Fill gaps with existing service types to the extent possible

- Reduce program barriers
- New program types



Engage expert thought partners to support planning / advocacy

 Consider future consulting engagement



Secure resources to support a local CUCOF if/when possible

- County GPR
- Hospital partnership
