22	Eliminate Racial Disparities
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24	The elimination of racial disparities and the elevation of racial equity are among the most important priorities
25	and responsibilities of Dane County. Specific areas that help alleviate racial disparities include Youth
26	Initiatives, Education, Prevention, Employment, Criminal Justice, Health Care, Housing, Transportation,
27 28	Economic Development, Contracting and Service Delivery.
20 29	In order to impact the current state and community crisis, we must be deliberate and proactive in our public

172	16) <u>Criminal Background Check:</u> Support additional funds to the Department of Justice to enable the
173	conducting of uniform criminal background checks of to-be-hired direct care workers by public and non-profit

175	17) Emergency Communications Interoperability: Enact local and state communication networks for
176	disaster events and fund through State grants.
177	18) Interstate Traffic Tickets: Amend State Statutes allowing Wisconsin to join the Interstate Compact on
178	Traffic Forfeitures to facilitate collection of out of state traffic violators and capture a needed revenue source for
179	the state and county.
180	19) <u>Multi-line Telephone System (MLTS) calls to 911</u> : Support legislation requiring owner/operators of

184	20) <u>Support Gun Control</u> : Ban habitual criminals from obtaining concealed carry permits, make the

187	subject to criminal background checks performed by a federally licensed gun dealer.
188	21) <u>Mental Health Screenings</u> : Support and fund mental health screening and treatment for inmates in
189	county juvenile detention, shelter homes and county jails.
190	22) <u>Legalize Marijuana: Enacted a referendum for Spring 2014 Election ballot, "Should the state</u>
190	government enact legislation legalizing marijuana?" Dane County voters approved by 64.5% yes votes

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278 <u>Public Health Services</u>279

1) <u>Response to Local Public Health Emergencies</u>: Support legislation that recognizes the critical role of
 local Public Health Departments in responding to public health emergencies and provides adequate funding to
 respond to all threats to public health.

283 2) <u>Public Health Prevention</u>: Support initiatives that maintain the integrity and effectiveness of public 284 health prevention services.

285 3) <u>Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease:</u> Support the WI Department of Health and Family Services in its efforts to
 286 amend the administrative code to include Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease as a reportable disease.

- 4) <u>Medical Marijuana</u>: Support legislation allowing residents with debilitating medical conditions to acquire and possess marijuana for medical purposes if supported by their physician. Dane County voters approved this item in 11/2/10 general election, 75.49% yes and 24.50% no.
- 5) <u>Women's Health Care</u>: Repeal all state laws that prohibit women from having access to safe and legal abortions, that don't protect women's health and don't ensure a woman's dignity, equality and autonomy.
- 293 Veteran Services

Armed Forces: Support the Dane County soldiers who are presently serving. Support protecting
 families and jobs rather than utilizing precious resources and funds to wage a war.

297 2) <u>VFW Halls</u>: Support a property tax exemption for chartered veterans' organizations.

298 3) Property Tax Credit: Eliminate the 65 year old age limit, drop the disability rating from 100% to 30% or
 299 greater, and allow 10 consecutive years of Wisconsin residency after separation (this expands eligibility to
 300 veteran applicants whose home of record was not Wisconsin).

301 4) <u>Trust Fund</u>: Support an increase from state GPR to help stabilize the Trust Fund so veterans will no
 302 longer pay for their own benefits and programs. The Trust Fund is financed through veteran programs such as
 303 personal and home loans.

304 5) <u>Wisconsin GI Bill</u>: Fully fund the Wisconsin GI Bill without any limitations on eligibility.

305 6) <u>State Funding for the Veteran Trust Fund</u>: Support increased funding in the State budget bill to insure
 306 solvency of the Veterans Trust Fund including but not limited to, the exploration of permanent state funding for
 307 the WI Dept. of Veteran Affairs and the veteran programs/benefits that the Department oversees.

308 7) <u>Ending Veteran Homelessness</u>: Support ending veteran homelessness by 2015 through maximizing
 309 state and federal resources and streamlining local housing processes.

3108)Mass Transit for Disabled Veterans: Support fully funding bus passes and other mass transit311costs for all service-connected disabled veterans in all Wisconsin locations and transit programs.

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Transportation, Land Use and the Environment Re-Format

315 1) <u>Water Quality</u>: Maintain level of DNR funds for water quality planning and watershed projects. 316 Support increased DNR financial assistance as an incentive to reduce non point source pollution. 317 Seek a fair share of state funding for inland waterways and lakes. Target state funds to where there is 318 a high likelihood of project success, where recipient units of government have a proven track record of 319 meeting state and local water resource goals. Support legislation to provide additional funding and 320 staffing for local water quality protection, improvement and unfunded mandates.

2) <u>Local Transportation</u>: Support a greater share of state and federal transportation funding going toward local transportation needs and services. Funding should be increased for General Transportation Aids, State Highway Maintenance, the County Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS) and Specialized Transportation for older adults and persons with disabilities. Require "farmland mitigation" for highway improvement projects. In addition, funding formulas that discriminate against urban counties should be revised and the local match (now 50%) for CHIPS should be decreased.

Support state-federal funding for Amtrak service to Milwaukee and Madison. Support continued state
 funding for further planning and implementation of a commuter rail system and regional bus links to

outlying communities in Dane County. Also, support increased funding for Transport 2020 and rail
 rehabilitation and purchases.

331 Support state/federal funding for the Midwest Regional Rail Initiative.

332 3) <u>Bicycle Trail Funding</u>: Work with Legislators and State Agencies to obtain transportation aids
 333 for bicycle trails with significant commuter traffic. Support allowing bike path maintenance costs to be
 334 eligible for transportation aids. Support the creation and development of a statewide Bike Trail Task
 335 Force. Integrate bicycle transportation into future commuter transportation systems.

336 4) <u>Regional Trail System</u>: Request DNR assistance in development of regional trail systems.

5) <u>Highway Workers Safety</u>: Earmark a portion of every state construction/maintenance contract
 to fund increased local law enforcement in construction/maintenance zones.

<u>Soil Erosion</u>: Support DNR and/or legislative streamlining of NR297 process to deal more quickly with cropland soil erosion that threatens water resources. Control soil erosion to acceptable limits, e.g., tolerable soil loss levels, for the production of food and fiber. Support DATCP Soil and Water Resource Management programs implementation, e.g., NR243 cost sharing and Land and Water Resource Management Plan implementation and cost sharing.

7) <u>Recycling</u>: Support long-term state funding for state's recycling program. Support continued
 state efforts to expand markets for recycled materials. Amend statutes to allow local governments or
 other entities to receive more than one state grant for innovative demonstration projects.

8) <u>Landfill Siting</u>: Allow municipalities to replace existing public landfills without a new DNR
 needs determination. Amend statutes to modify landfill negotiation-mediation process to include
 counties as an appropriate governing body for the approval of negotiated agreements. Amend
 statutes to prohibit the construction of landfills until the mediation-negotiating process is complete.

351 9) <u>Cleansweep</u>: Support increased state/federal funding for household and Ag Clean Sweep.

352 **10)** <u>Boating Laws</u>: Support legislation making fines and associated penalties for drunken boating
 353 commensurate with those for drunken driving.

- <u>Stewardship Fund</u>: Support annually adjusting the State Stewardship Fund for inflation to
 maintain at least 1990 funding levels. Eliminate Stewardship Fund requirements for hunting and
 trapping.
- 357 12) <u>State Urban Forestry Grants</u>: Allow towns, counties, and non-profits to access both the federal
 and state funds in the Urban Forestry Grant Program.
- 13) <u>Payments in Lieu of Taxes</u>: Authorize counties to make payments in lieu of taxes to other local
 units of government when the county takes land off the tax rolls for conservation purposes.
- 14) <u>Holding Tanks as Systems of Last Resort</u>: Support changes in statutes and administrative rules
 that oppose using holding tanks except as a last resort for new and replacement septic systems.
 Modify rules and statutes to ensure funding from the Wisconsin Fund is for the least costly systems,
 excluding holding tanks, unless a holding tank is the system of last resort.
- 365 15) <u>Revise Formula for DATCP Administrative Funding to Counties</u>: Support a revision in the 366 formula the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) uses to distribute 367 administrative funding to counties for administration of the Farmland Preservation Program, Nutrient 368 Management Program and the implementation of performance standards. Use criteria for distribution 369 that include number of farms, acres of cropland, number of livestock and amount of resource waters in 370 a county.
- 371 16) <u>State Commercial Building Code</u>: Support the exemption from the state Commercial Building
 372 Code of farm buildings used for agricultural purposes or horse boarding/stabling facilities.
- 373 17) <u>Fair Motorboat Gas Tax Allocation</u>: Support legislation to fairly allocate motorboat fuel tax
 374 through a more equitable distribution formula.
- 375 18) <u>Stormwater Utility</u>: Amend the WI Stats. to allow counties to create and manage a stormwater

- 377 19) <u>Mercury Products Ban:</u> The State should ban the sale of mercury-containing products, with the 378 exception of dental fillings and fluorescent lamps. If the ban is implemented on a phased-in basis, 379 retailers should be required to take back for recycling those mercury-containing products that they are
