WHY ARE CAREGIVERS CRITICAL TO OUR COMMUNITIES?

580,000 unpaid family caregivers in Wisconsin provide 490 million hours of care, valued at \$6.9 billion



- One in five Wisconsinites are Family Caregivers
- 80% of all care in Wisconsin is provided by families






ARPA Funding Provides a Unique Opportunity

- Air conditioner grants
- Complete cost for care partner moves
 from old homes to Independent Living
- Bathroom remodel to convert tub to zeroentry shower
- Cost of in-facility stay so caregiver can take vacation
- Cover significant increase in time for Adult
 Day Care
- Provide in-home care for the caregiver post hospital stay
- Cover complete cost of day care or summer camp for grandchildren

Grant Funding Approved -Comparison

2022

\$171,338.7964 grants total (August 1, 2022)\$2677.17 average grant (2.3 times higher)

2021 \$ 81,526.45 70 grants total \$1164.66 average grant

Impact of COVID-19 on Wisconsin Caregivers

- During the pandemic, caregivers of adults were more likely to report that COVID-19 is a threat to their communities and household than non-caregivers
- Caregivers took more precautionary behaviors, used fewer coping behaviors, and were more likely to forego healthcare than non-caregivers
- Caregivers also had significantly greater levels of stress than non-caregivers and continued to report an increase in feelings of burnout over the course the pandemic
- Caregivers with better community-based support had lower levels of distress during the pandemic
