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- Started program work in 2023, have already completed the recruiting and onboarding of a program coordinator
- Beginning the development of an outreach and marketing campaign to reach youth through social media and in-person pop up events

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- Number of youth participants served in the CareerScape Program: 30
- Number of youth participants served in the Options Program: 31
- Outreach staff has increased network of services through relationships building through active community engagement

Success story from program participant:

Rossi, a youth participant, was connected with a job shadow opportunity with Sony PlayStation, in which they were invited to apply for an internship, as well as given a chance to learn core concepts about being a programmer.

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PROGRESS:

- Sent out FNE surveys to community networks: surveys were successfully distributed to student groups through the PAVE student organization, as well as through UW Professor Dr. Kate Walsh
- Survey distributed to services organizations, including RCC, FNE Meriter, UW Survivor, UW Police, Women's Clinic, Project Respect, and DAIS (Sent to Executive Directors), next to SART and CCR
- Met with developers to find a viable contractor to work with Narrowed down to two potential developers who are capable of completing the project

UPCOMING

- Confirming developer and beginning the program implementation and development following survey feedback
- Considering a mobile application for the second year

2023 RFP UPDATES

- Violence Coalition Workgroups met and selected RFP priorities for the next year
- RFP Materials for the next year have been updated to be more concise and accessible
- In Dec 2022, an optional call for letters of inquiry went out:
 - 13 LOI responses came in
 - Totaling \$971,596 in requested funds

- Identify and increase resources—including support for community organizers and leaders--to respond and connect people to services when residents feel unsafe in their neighborhoods

- Promote connections to faith and/or sense of cultural identity to advance individual and community connection and resilience; and/or directly for the purpose of social development for chronic and repeat juvenile offenders

- Provide trauma screening, reduction and healing-informed care support to residents, professionals who address violence, and others experiencing primary and secondary trauma

A. Respond to hospitals and healthcare settings, or other scenes as requested, within the City of Madison to provide trauma informed crisis response to victims and perpetrators of violence.

B. Connect with at least 40 individuals at highest risk of gun violence victimization and perpetration and attempt to engage them in ongoing mentoring and light case management. C. Provide follow up contact to at least 20 individuals to encourage behavior change and connection to additional services and programming. D. Provide follow up care to at least 10 individuals, and connect them to peer support services and additional services and programming. E. Attend Community Safety Intervention Team (CSIT) meetings, other relevant community meetings, and regular meetings with the Madison Police Department related to violence prevention to serve as a potential referral resource.
