

Division of Children, Youth, and Families (CYF)

Mission:

"support families and individuals ... in providing safe and nurturing home and community environments for children ... in partnership with neighborhoods and communities ..."



CYF staff serve...

- children who have been victims of abuse and neglect, and their families
- youths who have committed delinquent acts, and their families
- youths and adults with mental health treatment needs
- youths and adults with substance abuse treatment needs
- families with emerging issues

CYF has the largest staff (196 FTE) among the Divisions:

- 1 administrator
- 7 human services managers
- 15 supervisors
- 131 social workers
- 18 social services specialists
- 11 support staff
- 9 program leaders
- 5 other (1 TA, 1 CPC, 1 CCC)

Social work managers, supervisors, and social workers are specialized: CPS, DEL, SC, JFF, other.

CYF staff is diverse: 47 staff (24 %) are people of color or other cultures.



CYF consumers are diverse so it is important that staff be diverse and culturally competent.

CYF services are decentralized to serve consumers.

- 2 full-service offices (NPO, SMO) across the County.
- NIP (Neighborhood Intervention Program)
- STO, SPO
- 20 JFF outposts
