







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CHILD HUNGER IS A HEALTH PROBLEM

- They are **sick more often** and **more likely to be hospitalized**, which leads to greater health care costs
- Their **physical, intellectual and emotional** development is impaired





CHILD HUNGER IS AN EDUCATIONAL PROBLEM

- The **development of the brain** can be altered during ages 0-3, a critical period of rapid growth
- They **fall behind in school** because they can't concentrate
- They have more **social and behavioral** problems




CHILD HUNGER IS A WORKFORCE PROBLEM

- Adults who experienced hunger as children are not as well prepared **physically, mentally, emotionally, or socially** for the workforce

Signs & Symptoms of Food Insecurity in Children



Feeding America's Child Hunger Strategy focuses on reaching children at the time when they are most in need:

- in the summer
- after school
- at home
- over weekends and school vacations



Second Harvest Child Hunger Initiatives

- Kids Cafes** – Providing meals, snacks, and nutrition education year-round during out-of-school times
- School Pantry Program** – Providing groceries at no cost to students and their families in a familiar and comfortable school setting
- School Outreach Initiative** – Ensuring school staff are aware of and distributing food resource information to families
- Technical Support** – Provide information and guidance for backpack programs and federal programs such as SFSP and CACFP



EFFECTIVE WAYS TO REACH CHILDREN:



- Increase the **amount of nutritious food** moving through food pantries/programs
- Improve **knowledge** of food pantries, mobile pantries, and other programs
- Facilitate **access** to FoodShare and other federal programs

School Food Pantries



Mission:

- Help alleviate child hunger through the provision of food to children and their families at school.

Objectives:

- Provide nutritious, healthy food to children at-risk of hunger for preparation and consumption at their place of residence.
- Distribute food discreetly in easily accessible and safe environments.

Pilots (Second Harvest Programs): Adams, Sparta, and Beloit

School Food Pantries



- More food to families
- Wider variety of food
- Perishables: produce, dairy, meat
- Parent's responsibility
- Customizable for customer
- Serves the entire family
- Lower cost
- Variety of distribution and storage models
- Fosters parent/school engagement
- Opportunity for nutrition education
- Convenient locations



Second Harvest Foodbank Pilot Programs



- Schools provide space for a permanent food pantry
- A community partner, such as a church or other food pantry, often coordinates volunteers and distributions
- Rural pilot sites successful
 - Adams School District – serving up to **75 families/month**
 - Since August 2014, distributed **220,000 lbs**
 - Sparta School District – serving up to **50 families/month**
 - Since October 2015, distributed **120,000 lbs**
 - Beloit School District – serving up to **50 families/month**
 - Since May 2015, distributed **105,000 lbs**
