



The annual number decreased by 7% between FY 2016 and FY 2018.

January PIT also decreased by 7% between 2016 and 2018.

New Clients Experiencing Homelessness




The number of newly homeless people slightly increased.

New clients to ES and TH: people who have not accessed ES, TH, or PH in the previous 24 months

Length of Homelessness at Emergency Shelters


Average # of Days



The average length of homelessness at Emergency Shelters decreased 3 days or 7%.

Exit to Permanent Housing from Outreach




Exit to permanent housing program from outreach improved significantly.

It exceeded Wisconsin (34%) and national averages (36% for all positive exits).

Exit to Permanent Housing from ES, TH and RRH




Exit to permanent housing from residential settings decreased by 10%.

It was worse than the Wisconsin average (41%) and the national average (42%).

Exit to PH from Residential Settings - by Household Types

| | Singles | Families |
|---------|---------------------------------|-------------------------------|
| ES & TH | 14% (194 out of 1,414 exits) | 57% (120 out of 211 exits) |
| RRH | 79% (63 out of 80 exits) | 78% (76 out of 97 exits) |
| All | 17% | 62% |

Retention of Permanent Housing



The percentage of people remaining in PH was consistent.

It was similar to the Wisconsin (96%) and the national average (95%).

Returns to Homelessness within 2 Years among exiters to PH from all: ES, TH, PH, and Outreach

Consistent

It was similar to the Wisconsin average (24%) but worse than the national average (19%).




Returns to Homelessness within 2 Years


among exiters to PH from PH

Increasing Total Income



The percentage of people who increased income was decreased from 2017 but was consistent with 2016.

It was lower than the Wisconsin average (40%) and the national average (34%).

| Performance Measure | Compared to 2 years ago | Compared to other communities |
|-----------------------------------|----------------------------|-------------------------------------|
| Return to Homelessness - from all | Consistent | Worse |
| Return to Homelessness - from PH | Concerning | Similar |
| Increasing Income | Consistent | Worse |

Staff Observations

- Majority of the people served in homeless services are newly homeless.
- Outreach programs are coordinating services and becoming more housing-focused.
- There is a big difference in successful exits among families (62%) and singles (17%).

Staff Observations (cont.)

- Permanent housing retention is not bad. But providers inform us of increased challenges in serving people with higher or special needs.
- Exits to PH from ES, TH and RRH continue to be the main challenge in our community.
- Increase in return to homelessness from PH is particularly concerning and needs to be evaluated further.
