Justice Center with procedural justice and procedural fairness as a central value	Mass processing of cases
Person Focused: Individuals are seen as key community members, the Justice Center succeeds when the community succeeds	System Focused
Space that allows for Community Court(s), Community Restorative Court, restorative practices, and wrap around services. Design is community focused.	Building that looks and feels like every other government building
Services available for those involved in the criminal justice system, either as victims or offenders, as well as members of the community seeking services	Space reserved for those with court proceedings and services available only to those with a current case
Design embedded in space, services, and outcomes using a racial equity lens	One size fits all space and services

Community Justice Centers are focused on procedural justice and racial equity. Procedural justice speaks to the idea of fairness in the processes that resolve disputes and allocate resources, and the concept is commonly described as having four pillars: **fairness, transparency, voice, and impartiality.**
