2 3	IN OPPOSITION TO NO KNOCK SEARCH WARRANTS
4 5	The death of Breonna Taylor in Louisville, Kentucky has raised awareness nationally of the risks to innocent people of the policing practice of no-knock warrants. A 2014 report from the
6 7 8	American Civil Liberties Union found that 20,000 no-knock warrants are issued each year in the United States.
9 10 11	Governor Evers has proposed a number of criminal justice reform actions, including a bill prohibiting the execution of no-knock search warrants. The wording of the proposed legislation is as follows:
12 13 14 15	"968.14 (1) When executing a search warrant, a law enforcement officer may not enter the premises subject to the warrant without first identifying that he or she is a law enforcement officer and announcing the authority and purpose of the entry."
16 17 18 19	Locally, the Drug Task Force has sought judicial approval to execute no knock warrants. The Sheriff could implement a policy to no longer seek judicial approval for this type of warrant, or to participate in executing a no knock warrant as a member of any Task Force.
20 21 22 23	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Dane County Board of Supervisors opposes the use of no-knock warrants and supports action by the Wisconsin State Legislature to prohibit this practice.
24 25 26 27	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Dane County Board of Supervisors urges the Dane County Sheriff to implement a policy to no longer seek judicial approval of no-knock warrants for his deputies acting alone or with other local law enforcement.
28 29	BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to Governor Evers, the Dane County legislative delegation, and Sheriff Mahoney.
