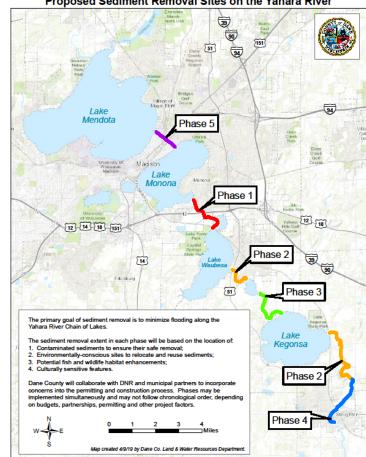

Equity & Inclusion Highlights

- Consistent all-staff training
- Simpson St Free Press and Boys & Girls Club Intern Programs
- Operation Fresh Start Partnership
- Long-term engagement with community centers (Bridge Lake Point Waunona, Bayview, Vera Court, Goodman, Henry Vilas Zoo School)
- Transitioning to all gender bathroom signage where possible and 100% ADA for portable toilets
- Improved process for issuing free permits when there is financial need
- Collaborative interpretation plan under development with the HoChunk Nation and other partners
- Partnership with County Board Office and Zoo to conduct an evaluation, using a racial and social
 equity lens, of Dane County Parks and the Henry Vilas Zoo and to provide recommendations for
 strategies and actions that would further advance racial and social equity and access at Dane
 County Parks and the Henry Vilas Zoo.



Service Delivery

- Increased our outdoor education and engagement programs
- More robust online and field-based reservation and sales systems for shelters, camping and park permits
- Meetings with landowners, producers (farmers) and developers by appointment rather than drop in
- Online option for erosion control & stormwater applications and payments
- Some, not all, meetings will continue to be virtual
- Tension between staff that must report to their job site and those that can work some hours remotely
- Difficult and innovative projects are harder to advance
- Not equipped for hybrid meetings
- Maintaining a positive workplace culture that inspires staff to do more than is strictly required will be an ongoing challenge.
