- 2016 Chicago meeting
 - City of Madison Mayor's Office, City of Madison Police Department, and Dane County Sheriff's Office
 - Beginning of data collection and evaluation
 - Reducing jail use for young adults through exploring costs and alternate funding options
 - Moving towards system of early diversion
- Data collection tools
 - Top 5 zip codes for arrests
 - Disorderly conduct the most common offense
 - White offenders had more citations, black offenders had more bookings
 - Quorum reached at 12:44pm
- Receiving technical assistance grant (Urban Institute, NACo, 19 months)
 - Invited to Washington DC
- Primary leadership roles for city government
 - Increase pre-arrest diversion
 - Reduce racial and ethnic disparities in arrests and jail bookings
 - Develop and sustain robust system of community based services to support and reentry
- Intercept model: focus on intercept 0 and intercept 1
- Pre-arrest Diversion (PAD)
 - Police, treatment, and community collaborative
 - Promises to reduce crime, improve public safety, building police-community relations, reduce burden on criminal justice to solve public health and social challenges, etc.
 - Two types of PAD: prevention PAD and intervention PAD
- Next steps
 - Dive into 3-year historical data starting in the new year
 - Report back to CJC
 - National League of Cities to visit in spring of 2018
 - Possibly add a representative from Mayor's Office as an advisory member of the Criminal Justice Council
