A. Call To Order

Chair PORTER called the meeting to order at 5:07 pm.

The commission agreed to change the meeting order to accommodate members of the public who wanted to comment but had to leave early. Agenda item K " Public Comment on Items not on the Agenda" was moved to follow agenda item A "Call to Order."

K. Public Comment on Items not on the Agenda

Laura Olah, representing Citizens for Safe Water Around Badger, expressed concern about persistent biocumulative toxins in Starkweather Creek and encouraged commissioners to offer support for a community informational meeting about topic.

Maria Powell, representing Midwest Environmental Justice Organization, expressed concern about PFAS and other water quality contaminants in Starkweather Creek and requested that the commission include this topic on a future agenda to explore the issue in more depth.

Eric Uram, representing Headwater LLC, encouraged Dane County and the Lakes and Watershed Commission to take a leading role in gathering additional data on PFAS in Starkweather Creek and finding solutions to deal with the problem.

PORTER gave an overview of the Commission's Executive Committee recommendations for the 2019 budget (attached), organized under the initiatives of public safety, phosphorus reduction, chloride pollution reduction, enhanced community outreach and education, and supporting other county investments in water resource management.

2. Public Hearing

PORTER began the public hearing at 5:20 pm

Ida Jammeh, representing Midwest Environmental Justice Organization, spoke about the lack of water quality knowledge in the neighborhoods around Starkweather Creek and recommended that Dane County devote resources to test fish and water quality in the creek and share that information with the local residents. Jammeh expressed that this is an environmental justice issue. Jammeh's written comments follow in communication file.

Touyene Xiong, representing Midwest Environmental Justice Organization, spoke about his concern with toxins (including PFAS, PCBs, and Petroleum) in Starkweather Creek and recommended that Dane County, as a landowner in the watershed, test and identify contaminant sources. Xiong expressed that this is an environmental justice issue. Xiong's written comments follow in communication file.

Maria Powell, representing Midwest Environmental Justice Organization, spoke about trash and toxins in Starkweather Creek and requested the commission include funding for monitoring and mitigating contaminants in their 2019 budget as a public safety initiative. She also recommended that county ask international guard to have public meeting to talk about PFAS. Powell expressed that this is an environmental justice issue. M Powell's written comments follow in communication file as well as a map she presented.

Jim Powell, representing Midwest Environmental Justice Organization, encouraged the county to consider testing water and sediment in Starkweather Creek for the full spectrum of contaminants that could be in the water to get a complete picture of water quality. Powell expressed that this is an environmental justice issue. J Powell's written comments follow in communication file.

James Tye, representing Clean Lakes Alliance, thanked the commission for including beach monitoring in their 2019 budget and requested that the county provide a \$2500 grant to help CLA expand its E. coli testing at beaches, working in partnership with MDCPH. Tye also thanked the commission for including funding for the Lake Explorers program and recommended amending the amount with \$5,000 to support the Bayview program as well as \$5,000 to expand the program to the Catholic Multicultural Center. Tye also encouraged the commission to include county funding (one third of the total cost) to update the Yahara Clean Plan.

Caryl Terrell, representing CRANES, spoke in favor of the commission's continued support of funds for the UWQ grant program and funds to create a written report to evaluate the program to date. She also thanked the commission for considering stormwater and for their initiatives to reduce phosphorus pollution.

3. Commission Deliberation

The following amendments were proposed:

•to section 3, delete the sentence "Although not a human health hazard, increased salt levels impair the taste of drinking water."

•to section 1E, add an amount of \$5000 for the additional staff hours

•to section 4B, amend dollar amount to continue current Bayview funding, expand the Bayview program to three new grade levels and create a new program for the Catholic Multicultural Center.

•to section 2A, amend language to read "During this period, leases for all county-owned land (purchased via the taxpayer-funded Dane County Conservation fund) which are steep sloped or high in phosphorus will be converted to perennial vegetation. Over time, wherever practical, other county owned lands will be converted to prairie or perennial vegetation."

•to section 1A, add language to read "We recommend increased funding for PHMDC to provide additional staff and supplies for collecting and processing more frequent sampling at beaches and for development of a unified monitoring plan for Dane County surface waters done in coordination with other ongoing monitoring efforts (i.e. USGS, Clean Lakes Alliance)."

•to section 2D, amend language to read "...fewer than half of farms in Dane County have NM plans registered with DATCP that meet state standards."

POWER commented that she would like to see the commission form a Starkweather Creek work group to explore the topic that came up tonight. The group would determine what the County is already doing and if there are any future budget recommendations needed.
