

Most Dane County births in 2020 were to White, Black/African American, and Hispanic/Latino people.




Dane County births, 2020 (N=5,665)

Black/African-American babies have higher rates of preterm birth compared to Dane County babies overall.





Preterm birth rates for **Hispanic/Latino babies** have steadily increased over time and are now higher compared to **Dane County babies overall**.



Black/African-American & Hispanic/Latino babies experience higher mortality compared to Dane County babies overall.




About 1 in 3 Dane County births in 2020 were covered by Medicaid/ BagderCare. 31% of Medicaid/ BadgerCare births are firsttime births.




Improved perinatal referral system-140% increase in referrals since 2020
