Petersen shared that as Advocacy and Public Policy Director for GWAAR she is the liaison to the Wisconsin Aging Advocacy Network, a coalition of professional and older adult-focused organizations and groups that advocate for policy priorities related to older adults.

WAAN held its 2026 Day of Action, which included an advocacy training session, on May 6 as part of its Older Americans Month activities with the intention of energizing aging-focused professionals and citizen advocates to have a conversation with legislators about priorities.

WAAN has identified four state funding advocacy priorities for 2027 -- Home Delivered Meals, Aging & Disability Resource Centers, Falls Prevention Initiatives and Specialized Transportation Programs -- ahead of the state budget season. Efforts continue to make contact with legislators who are in their districts due to the session having ended ahead of upcoming elections and may wish to elevate aging-related initiatives while campaigning.

Petersen shared this is an excellent time for citizen advocates to get involved in advocacy events such as the In-District Legislative Information Session co-hosted by AAA and ADRC of Dane County on June 17 or by starting a conversation with the elected officials in their districts.

Educating legislators about issues that impact older adults will be a priority in early 2027 as newly elected officials take office, including a new governor and state agency secretaries. That effort will extend to newly elected federal officials following the mid-terms.

Petersen shared that WAAN will soon send a save-the-date notice for Aging Advocacy Day at the state capitol on May 11, 2027.

b. County/State/Federal Legislative Update

Dane County Executive Assistant Lacy Fox reported that she continues to monitor issues pertaining to her former position as Dane County Government Affairs Director as the process continues to fill the vacancy created by her job change, which was announced on April 30.

c. State's Aging Advisory Council

State Aging Advisory Council Chair Esther Olson provided an overview of the group's activities, which began in mid-2018 with the creation of bylaws.

The Council, which aims to include representatives from all parts of the state and all tribal organizations, elevates aging-related matters to the State Office on Aging within the Bureau of Aging & Disability Resources and disseminates information back to counties and tribes.

A major focus of the group, which meets six times per year and works with the State Office on Aging to determine the agenda, is to provide input on programs and supports delivered through the Older Americans Act.

The Council received a presentation about the financial exploitation of older adults from Gena Schupp, Adult Protective Services Coordinator with the State Office on Aging, during its June meeting. Olson suggested the new AAA Advisory Council may benefit from hearing the presentation.

Olson reported the Office on Aging has hired a grant specialist who may be able to assist AAAs, and shared that the state's representative in the Administration for Community Living had returned to the position after a significant restructuring that created a service gap.

Olson reported a major topic of discussion has been Wisconsin Act 115, which passed in the legislature earlier this month and impacts incapacitated individuals who do not have a valid Power Of Attorney by allowing "Next of Kin" to make the decision to transfer them out of the hospital to a post-acute care facility without establishing court-appointed guardianship. The Office on Aging plans a major education effort in hopes of increasing the number of individuals who have a POA. AAA Manager Lynn Riley shared that AAA and the ADRC of Dane County hope to conduct outreach regarding the importance of having a POA.

Riley stated AAA employees are members of USAging, which supports the national network of Area Agencies on Aging and advocates for the Title VI Native American Aging Programs, and offered to add members and guests to the organization's email list if desired.

Riley referenced USAging's Advocacy Tools for Fiscal Year 2027 Older Americans Act appropriations.

e. Wisconsin Aging Advocacy Network

Riley reported she is a member of the WAAN leadership team and will keep the Committee advised about the organization's activities.

f. Chair & Staff Reports

i Update from the In-District Legislative Information Session

Riley reported that Dane County staff were pleased with the In-District Legislative Information Session co-hosted by AAA and ADRC of Dane County on June 17. Dane County Executive Melissa Agard and Dane County Department of Human Services Director John Schlueter made opening remarks and attended the proceedings. ADRC Acting Manager Bill Huisheere and Riley provided overviews of their agencies and four community members provided moving testimonials about how services involving WAAN's four 2027 funding advocacy priorities -- Home Delivered Meals, ADRCs, Falls Prevention Initiatives and Specialized Transportation Programs -- improved their situations. Riley stated that in addition to the elected officials, the event had a meaningful impact for the 40-plus individuals in attendance.

ii. AAA Advisory Council Update

AAA Aging Program Specialist Claire Purkis reported the inaugural meeting of the AAA Advisory Council is scheduled for 3 p.m. today. The agenda for the 12-member group, which will advise the AAA Board, includes introductions, an overview of AAA, initial education about the Older Americans Act and the AAA Aging Plan, and officer elections.

iii. Any Suggestions for Future Presentations?

Olson suggested that BADR's Helen Sampson be invited to provide her presentation "Reframing Aging." Riley plans to invite Sampson to an upcoming AAA Board meeting and will invite members of this body to attend.
